ASSESSORS HELD VALUED MEETING

Klamath Press: County Assessor Capt. J. P. Lee returned yesterday afternoon from Salem, where he attended the convention of county assessors held there the 16th. Every assessor in the state, except one, was at this meet, the absent one being the assessor of Lake county, which shows the interest taken by these men in the affairs of their several counties. The assessors also met with the state tax commission, which held its meeting on the 14th and 15th.

Assessor Lee states that in his mind it was the best assessors' convention he ever attended in this state and that the spirit shown there was that of unity, all taking keen interest in their work and all outlining together for one common good. He also said that he believed the results would be beneficial and everlasting to the whole state. The captain said he gained a great many new and good ideas and that he believed that Klamath county would receive no little benefit from this convention if, for no other reason, than a spirit of working and pulling together, was very manifest.

A commission was appointed by the state meeting consisting of state senators and representatives and the state tax commission to investigate and draft a bill to be presented to the next session of the state legislature for the purpose of cutting off the notes secured by mortgages and in its place to create an income tax law of the state. This commission also drafted another bill which will cause household goods to be exempt, up to a certain amount, household goods from assessment, with the exception of rooming houses and hotels. The limit of value on household goods will be \$500. This bill's aim is to help the poor man or the man of limited resources.

Captain Lee also said they went through the state penal institution and the state asylum. He said they are doing a great work down there and the penitentiary especially showed more improvement than any other institution of like nature that he ever had occasion to visit. Of the asylum he said they were doing a great work there but that they were handicapped because of the reason that they have been

left out of the state appropriations and consequently have been unable to accomplish what they could have, had they received this money. He said that Dr. Steiner and the others in charge need encouragement from the people in order that they may handle this institution in the best possible manner. He also stated that 146 of the inmates of the asylum are working, making shoes and other articles.

The captain in concluding dwelt on the fact of the kindly feeling and the "pull together" spirit manifested and he predicts a great improvement all over the state along this line as far as the assessors are concerned.
