### SHOULD DEVELOP OWN RESOURCES

That not one barrel of the 1,500,000 barrels of Portland cement valued at \$3,000,000, used in the Portland territory last year, was manufactured in the state is one of the startling statements in the new bulletin on "The Economic Mineral Resources of Oregon" by Prof. H. M. Parks of the O.A.C. school of mines, who is publishing the new work at Salem.

Although Oregon produced approximately \$4,000,000 worth of geological products in 1910, more than \$12,000,000 worth were imported from other states and foreign countries, over three-fourths of which could have been produced in the state. More than \$4,000,000 worth of clay products, such as brick, tile, pottery, terr-cotta and fire clay materials were used in the vicinity of Portland alone last year, and but \$1,000,000 worth of these were manufactured in Oregon.

California and Washington have for some years spent thousands of dollars investigating the mineral resources of their territory, while Oregon has done practically nothing in this direction. Prof. Parks advocates a more thorough knowledge of the geological resources of the state, through a careful investigation the results of which may be published to the world. Thus the cement man, for instance, will be attracted here to develop the limestone deposits just as they have hitherto been developed in the states north and south of us through the dissemination of accurate information regarding such deposits.

### FREE BACTERIA FOR THE FARMER

Free bacteria for the raising of leguminous crops, such as alfalfa, peas, beans, and clovers, will be furnished to the farmers of Oregon upon request by the department of bacteriology at the Oregon Agricultural college. The experiment station experts have been busy preparing this material for the inoculation of soil for some time, and will send full directions for its use with each culture. Those desiring the material should send their requests at least two weeks in advance of the time they wish to use it, stating what leguminous crops they desire to raise, and how much land they intend to plant.

Any one who has examined the roots of a thrifty plant of this sort of crop know that there are found on the roots small lumps, known as nodules. Scientific study has shown these to be caused by bacteria infecting the roots, and that unless these are present, a good stand will not be obtained, showing that the bacteria are necessary to the full growth of the plant. If the soil does not contain the bacteria, a good catch of the crop may not be expected. By using these cultures the proper bacteria may be introduced into the soil. Where a crop has never been grown on a piece of land, as where alfalfa is being introduced, or when the stand obtained has not been satisfactory and it is known that the lack was not that of sufficient lime, such cultures can be used with good effect. They will not, however, correct lime deficiency, nor will the bacteria thrive in acid soil. For this reason, lime should be applied where needed before the culture is used.

**Sea Mowing Machine**

The first sea mowing machine has recently been launched at San Diego, California, for the purpose of cutting the millions of tons of kelp and seaweed that grow along the coast.

A gasoline launch has been fitted with a horizontal jack shaft revolving at right angles to the keel. Two vertical shafts are fitted with four foot blades that revolve at high speed 10 feet below the surface. The mowed kelp floats ashore, is taken out and dried and later is hauled to a factory to be converted into fertilizer.—Ex.

**China Gets Big Sum**

The International syndicate of bankers representing the United States, Great Britain, Germany and France, has placed to the credit of the government 320,000 taels, approximately \$224,000, and also agreed to pay the Chinese representative abroad \$125,000. Next week \$420,000 is to be paid to the government at Peking.

The bankers intend financing the government or governments until Chinese finances are restored to the normal condition. They expect to advance \$4,200,000 or \$24,900,000 within the next two or three months.

The United States transport Warren sailed this March 9 for Taku, thirty miles from Tien Tsin, with seventeen officers and 468 men of the Fifteenth Infantry on both.

**To Wall Street**

Teddy Roosevelt, Jr., has quit the furniture business and San Francisco, to embark in the Wall Street game.

Young Theodore has been employed as a salesman in a furniture concern since going to San Francisco three years ago. He announced at that time that he was going to learn the business from the ground up.

Recently he went to New York and while there made arrangements to enter the banking business.

### LABOR COUNCIL DAMAGES OREGON

Returns are beginning to come in from the vicious circular of misinformation sent out to Eastern governors and newspapers by the Portland labor council. The Des Moines Capital gleefully printed the circular in full on its front page, and the Indianapolis Sun prints it, and comments on it editorially. It says in part:

"A warning to Indiana people without capital to keep away from the state of Oregon has been issued by the Central Labor Council of Portland and vicinity through Governor Marshall. Unscrupulous employers of labor, and dishonest real estate men are held responsible for the misleading advertising which has brought thousands of people from the eastern states only to find their dreams blasted.

These papers are only chance instances. Every newspaper in the East and the Middle West will feature this utterly false and misleading story, because it will be considered good 'copy.' Oregon's opportunities are drawing people in thousands from less favored regions, and arguments against Oregon—however false they may be—are valuable.

If the real workmen of the state were behind this misguided movement, the situation would be hard to understand. When it is known that it is the work of a few demagogic leaders who are playing for their own personal ends, the truth becomes apparent.

Oregon will survive this unwarranted and cowardly attack upon her good name. Oregon offers too bright a future to the man who is willing to work to suffer long from those who seek merely to discourage the worker.

### O. A. COLLEGE TO ASSIST FARMERS

"Agriculture needs men for leadership in agricultural thought and activity," said Dr. James Withcombe, addressing the Agricultural Club at O. A. C. "and it is expected that this college shall do its share in supplying this class of men for the farms of Oregon."

"The field for leadership is broad and open. We need men not only possessed with the art of making two blades of grass grow where but one grew before, but men with the ability to organize, to prevent economic wastes, the matter of crop distribution presents one of the greatest agricultural problems of today. Note the waste annually occurring in our state. It is estimated that the farms of Oregon produced last year commodities approximately valued at \$124,000,000. Fully half of this found its way to the channels of trade, and fifty per cent of this was consumed in the cost of distribution. In other words, it costs the farmers \$31,000,000 to market \$162,000,000 worth of produce. This tremendous marginal difference between what the producer pays must be reduced. Conservation, intelligent agricultural organizations are the solution of the problem."

**Spanish Railroad**

John F. Stevens, formerly president of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle system, has secured for his new company a \$60,000,000 contract for construction of a big railroad in Spain. After leaving the northwest Stevens went to New York, where he organized the John F. Stevens Engineering Company, with offices at 55 Wall street, taking J. P. Morgan and Baring Bros., London as silent partners. According to the contract this company will construct the railroad and turn it over ready for operation to the Spanish government. While connected with the northwest Hill lines, Stevens lived both in Spokane and Portland.

**Novel 1915 Features**

On his return from Washington, President Chas. C. Moore stated that Secretary of State Knox had issued invitations to foreign governments to participate in the Panama-Pacific International Exposition: that Secretary of the Interior Fisher had promised that the Yosemite and other National Parks in the West would be improved and rendered as attractive as possibly by 1915; that the Treasury Department will issue Government gold and silver coins commemorating of the Exposition; and that the Post Office Department will issue special stamps before the Exposition opens.
