Paisley Pick-ups

(Chewaucan Press)

The Chewaucan Land and Cattle Company, as predicted by the Press a couple of weeks ago, has filed suit against H. L. Chandler for cutting the fence of the company to allow the stage to pass through.

Pat J. Murphy informs us that he has completed the purchase of over 800 wethers from Henry Balley and that he will take them over today, Thursday. The price paid was \$3.75 per head, which is very cheap considering that the wool clip will lower these figures by at least \$1.25 per head. The firm of Fitzpatrick & Murphy now has over 3700 head of sheep of all kinds, outside of this season's lambs.

Dr. A. A. Witham has returned from California to his ranch on Summer Lake. And, by the way, he brought back a recipe for killing ground squirrels that should prove very successful. It is as follows: Take a small piece of calcium carbide, such as is used in bicycle and automobile lamps, and place this in the hole where the squirrels live. Pour some water on it and the gas thus generated will fill the hole and smother anything in it. It is claimed that this system is more effective than poison and the farmers should give it a trial.

A. A. Henry informs the Press that it is his intention to start a daily stage between Lakeview and Paisley about the middle of April. A round trip will be made every day, leaving Paisley at 7:30 a. m. and arriving in Lakeview before noon. Leaving Lakeview at about 1:30 p. m. and arriving in Paisley about 5. In this manner he will connect with the train which arrives in the county seat at 11:25 a. m. and leaves at 1:00 p. m. An effort will be made to secure a through mail contract for this line, which would bring the mail to Paisley one day sooner than under the present arrangement. Mr. Henry will have two autos for passengers and is also making arrangements for an auto truck to carry light and heavy freight. This service will be one of great value to Paisley.

Mining Recorder Elected

Bidwell Gold Nuggett: The miners of the High Grade district held an interesting meeting last Tuesday evening in the town hall. Joe Breuner was unanimously elected Mining Recorder for the district, a most excellent choice on the part of the miners. He will hold office for one year, and his office will be in the new bank building as soon as the building is completed. The fees for recording were made one dollar and the recording of claims was made compulsory. Mr. Breuner announced to the meeting that he would be absent in Denver for about three weeks making arrangements for an excursion train carrying 200 to 250 miners who will come to High Grade to visit and inspect the mines. His announcement was received with loud applause. During his absence a deputy will perform the duties of Mining Recorder. A transcript of all the mining locations in the district will be prepared for the books of the County Recorder and be kept in Mr. Breuner's office.

Three-Year Homestead

Senator Clark on Tuesday left the chair long enough to make a speech on the floor in support of the bill to amend the homestead laws that has passed the House. The bill provides that a three-year period shall be sufficient to "prove up" on homestead claims. The only homesteads on the continent except in the United States have a three-year homestead law. Canada has a three-year homestead law, and Texas which manages its own lands, has a three-year homestead law.

Wool Bill Passes

With only two Democrats voting against it, and 20 progressive Republicans voting for it, the Democratic Wool Bill passed the House of Representatives on Monday. Among the Republicans voting for the bill was A. W. Luffery of Oregon. Supporters of the bill declare that it will not cut the Government's revenue, but will save more than \$50,000,000 to the consumers because of re-adjustment of rates. In public hearings before the passage of the bill it was shown that the cost of producing varies from one-twentieth of a cent per pound in Washington to thirteen cents per pound in Wyoming.

GENERAL NEWS

Two run-a-way teams furnished a few moments excitement Monday. A delivery team got loose without a driver, and our city marshal was on the job. After failing to grasp the horses by the bridles he crawled in over the rear of the wagon, secured the lines and stopped the team without damage. The second team was that of Geo. Jones, and was stopped by the telephone pole at the hotel corner with only a nominal damage.

S. C. Canfield, of Ashland, who has been corresponding with the Commercial Club with reference to the estab-

lishment of a creamery at Lakeview, arrived Wednesday, and will take up the matter personally with the farmers. It may be thought advisable to call a meeting of the farmers for Saturday, the 13th, for conference upon the matter. Further notice will be given those interested.
