GOVERNOR SAYS TO PUBLISH BUDGET

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oregon, March 23.—Plans for making the budget requests of public institutions public through the press long enough before action of the legislature is called for, so that the people of the state may have opportunity to know what appropriations should be made, that the state might be saved much expense without depriving state institutions of funds needed for their proper conduct, were announced this week by Governor West in an address before the students of the Oregon Agricultural College.

"When the people of the state feel the burden of high taxes," they strike first at the educational institutions," said the Governor. "These should, of course, be the last to feel it. But such is not the case. Anything this institution can do to solve the problem of reducing the expense of state government will work directly toward the interest of education, for a saving of money to state will lighten the burden and make it easier to make appropriations for educational purposes."

"There has been no system in the past in making up the budgets for appropriations. When the legislators have come to the capitol they have been given measures to pass upon and been staggered by the sums involved, being unused to dealing with so large accounts. They have come with every intent to protect the interests of their constituents, and any mistakes they have made have been. I am convinced from lack of information which should be given them in ample time so that they may consider and give the ensuring legislation their mature judgment. The fault lies with those who have the information at hand and should have given it out in advance."

"We have therefore adopted this plan. In September will call upon the heads of the different institutions for estimates as to the amounts needed, and a board will go over these amounts and, if they consider that they are really needed, will stamp them with their approval and give them out to the press ninety days before the legislature meets. Every man and woman will then know what is asked for, and will have an opportunity to find out why this amount is needed. When the members of the legislature meet the first of the year they will come knowing just what the expenses of the institutions are. The board of regents will come before the ways and means committee and have a chance to show why an appropriation is needed. If the appropriation is approved, the bill is prepared and introduced by the ways and means committee as a ways and means committee bill. If not approved, it can only be introduced on the floor of the house as a private bill, that is, introduced by some champion of the cause. Thus the public is fully advised, and the members of the legislature know what is to be asked for. It will eliminate graft and exorbitant demands, and will keep appropriations down to a business basis. It will cut out lots of opposition to the educational institutions, as the public will be better acquainted with the needs of the institutions. It is going to do away with lots

of logrolling and lots of extravagance. "There should be a closer connection between the state institutions. Every state farm should be connected with this institution to make it an experiment farm, so that this state may have the best state farms in the world. By utilizing the grounds of these institutions you will extend the influence of this institution as well. We are going to work it out."

Congressman Goetz of Ohio has introduced a bill for parcels express. This is said to eliminate many of the objections to the ordinary Parcels Post as a delivery system for retail mail-order houses. It provides for condemnation of the express companies refusing to carry parcels as such rates as the Interstate Commerce Commission shall determine. Something like this was proposed by Nathan B. Williams of Arkansas in behalf of Parcels Post. It was remarked by a member of the committee that such legislation would be confiscatory and that the railroads could not be compelled to do service at rates which they declined. Such little matters as personal or property rights do not seem to weigh heavily with the advocates of revolutionary methods.

PUBLIC READING MUST BE BOUGHT

No doubt most people interested in useful reading desire information obtained through official sources, as to how public documents can be procured with least trouble and at trifling expense. The idea that prevails most generally, that this class of literature may be secured through the courtesy of members of Congress, is correct in only so slight a degree that it had best be corrected. There are nearly 500 senators and representatives—hence an edition of several thousand copies, if distributed pro rata, gives to each only a few copies. Some of these the Senator or Representative needs for reference, the few left over are soon exhausted, and those constituents who then write for them are necessarily disappointed, through no fault of the public man whom they have addressed. Now as a general proposition, the reader who is interested in a Government publication will serve himself best by addressing the official known as the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., who is authorized to have reprinted any Government publication for which there is a demand, and sell the same, at cost, to all applicants. He will mail price lists, divided by subjects, free upon application, and remittance can then, as required by law authorizing such sales, accompany order.

WILL INVESTIGATE ALL CORPORATIONS

Secretary of State Olcott has consented to undertake an investigation of all Oregon corporations regarding the business methods of which complaints are made to the secretary's office.

While there is no law on the statute books giving the secretary of state or any other state official authority to examine the books and business methods of corporations that may happen to fall under suspicion, it is thought the great majority of companies doing a legitimate business will be glad to take advantage of an opportunity voluntarily to furnish the secretary's office with such information as may be desired.

When complaints are received to the effect that a certain corporation is insolvent, that it is doing business in violation of law, or that its assets are being dissipated by reckless and incompetent management, the secretary's office will write to the corporation inviting a showing of assets and full particulars regarding its prospects, plan of business, etc. The information thus obtained will be arranged in convenient form for reference and will be supplied to those interested in the stock of other property of the corporation. If the corporation refuses to give any information regarding its condition, the fact of such refusal will be communicated to correspondents and to the newspapers.

Mr. Olcott's plan has the approval of the committees appointed by the various public bodies of Portland to investigate the subject and recommend the enactment of adequate protective legislation by the next session of the legislature, and many of the leading lawyers and business men of the state.

The plan of Secretary Olcott is a temporary expedient, designed to provide some measure of protection to investors until such time as the legislature shall enact adequate legislation for that purpose. The plan is similar to that adopted in Kansas prior to the passage of the Blue Sky law, which in the past year has shut out hundreds of questionable companies, and which is being considered as the basis of a new corporation code in Oregon.
