## ROOSEVELT HAS HAD SOME HARD BUMPS

### His Recent Campaigns Show He Has Failed to Muster Votes.

Can a man who disregards the whole course of American history and tradition, spurred on by his personal ambition, overcome the tremendous handicap of the third term precedent and land himself in the White House?

This is a question all Republicans are asking. All agree that no American has ever been able to do it and they can count on one finger the number who even had the hardihood to try it, and that only when spurred on by self-seeking politicians who posed as friends. People are asking themselves if this is not the condition in the present campaign.

Past performances are as valuable in the case of candidates as of race horses. How a candidate will run is best determined by noting how he has run.

### Not a Strong Vote Getter.

Despite a tremendous popularity in the past, Roosevelt has never been a remarkable vote-getter. Mr. Bryan too, is remarkably strong all over the country and has been for years, but everyone knows how he failed to muster the votes. When Roosevelt was elected to the presidency, he ran against a weak opponent. Judge Parker did not have the support of his own party in that election.

But what Roosevelt has done since, and indeed very recently, in vote-getting is more significant than his former campaigns. Results of the last election speak louder than anything else.

In New York, where the personality of the ex-president actually overshadowed that of Mr. Stimson, the republican candidate for governor, a democrat was elected by a majority of 67,000.

In Indiana, where Mr. Roosevelt made a whirlwind campaign in his effort to save the state and re-elect

his intimate friend and would-be running mate, Senator Beveridge, the democratic candidate was elected by a majority of 12,000.

His Attacks Helped. In Connecticut, Mr. Roosevelt attacked the democratic candidate for governor, but he was elected by a majority of 3,753.

In New Hampshire, where Mr. Roosevelt's friend and champion, Robert P. Baas, was elected, the vote fell off 12,000 as compared with the majority given to Mr. Taft in 1908.

As further evidence that Mr. Roosevelt's star is waning, may be cited the fact, that the announcement of the Roosevelt candidacy for the third term did not evoke throughout the country anywhere near the predicted enthusiasm. In fact, the big shout that was supposed to follow the throwing of T. R.'s hat into the ring was noticeably absent, from Massachusetts to Oregon. In many places it never rose above a whisper.

## MUCH MONEY LOST ON SCHOOL LANDS

Oregon Daily Journal: "The school fund of the state of Oregon has been eaten out of millions of dollars simply because the state land boards have not had data as to the value of school lands that have been sold." is the surprising statement made today by State Land Agent T. A. Rinehart.

"We don't know any more about the true value of the state school land than you do," he said to The Journal correspondent, who is absolutely ignorant on the subject.

"Soaking in round numbers, we have \$900,000 in the school fund, and we ought to have \$20,000,000. Nearly all the school land in western Oregon has been sold—at some price. We have about 50,000 acres of school land left, most of which is in the eastern part of the state. An appraisal of the land has never been made.

"When man comes to the state land board and wants to buy school land, he offers a price and we have no information by which we can tell whether the offer is to pay full value for the land or only one third of its value. As you may depend on it that the offer is usually much less than the true value.

"We have a minimum price fixed of \$7.50 an acre. School land that is worth more than the price has been readily sold, while the real \$7.50 land and poorer quality has been left on the state's hands."

This matter came before the state land board in a proposition State Land Agent Rinehart made to undertake the appraisal of all the school land left to the state. He is urging the board to permit him to begin on the task in May, after the weather is settled. His plan is to take wagon and team and make a personal inspection of every section belonging to the state. He says the work will take two or three summers to accomplish, but that the data secured will be the means of saving to the school fund large sums. Just now the land board is negotiating with the federal government in an effort to get the government to send a special agent here to clear up the state's title to certain swampy lands within that state. If the agent is sent and the work is done the coming summer it will likely interfere with State Land Agent Rinehart undertaking the appraisal of the school lands until next year.

### DIXON FACES BOTH WAYS

Hopes to Save His Political Neck by Jumping Fence.

Senator Dixon, of Montana, who is Roosevelt's campaign manager in the third term fight, is a shining example of Mr. Facing-Both-Ways in politics.

Last October President Taft passed through the state of Montana making stops at Butte, Livingston, Billings and some minor points. At each of these stops, Senator Dixon gave a fine imitation of a man whose loyalty to President Taft was unswerving, and he assured a Washington correspondent who accompanied the President's party that Montana would send a solid Taft delegation to the national convention and that the state would be found in the Republican column in November.

This was, of course, before the third term announcement of Mr. Roosevelt. It is of interest, however, to note that from many sources in Montana, even then, was heard the prediction that Mr. Dixon would fail of re-election.

These facts lend color to the statement recently made that a number of the strongest Roosevelt supporters throughout the country who are so firmly declaring for a third term are those who have no political future to sacrifice and who have everything to gain and but little to lose.

### DID CAREY MAKE BLUNDER?

Wyoming People Believe He is on Wrong Side.

Governor Carey, of Wyoming, after hesitating for several days, finally declared himself for the Roosevelt third term. Many of his supporters in Wyoming regard this as a grave political mistake.

This view is held because it is recognized that the re-election of Colonel Roosevelt would restore Gifford Pinchot to power, probably to a place in the Roosevelt cabinet, and there is no man in Wyoming so little liked as the former forester.

A full stop was brought to the development of Wyoming under the Pinchot administration of affairs and only under the rule of Secretary Fisher have normal conditions been practically restored.
