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EASTERN OREGON GOOD FOR CORN

"In Eastern Oregon one of the greatest advantages of the corn crop is that it is a very low moisture consumer, and since it will permit thorough cultivation and moisture conservation, it may be used as a substitute crop in place of the summer fallow," said Prof. H. D. Scudder, head of the O. A. C. agronomy department in discussing the results of the corn breeding experiments at the college.

"This gives a return for the handling of the land," he continued, "getting rid of the weeds and leaving the ground in nearly as good a condition for the wheat crop to follow as would the costly summer fallow."

"In the irrigated sections of Eastern Oregon, and throughout the humid sections of Western Oregon, corn can be replaced by no other plant as a green feed in the late summer and as silage throughout the winter. These facts have led the college to devote much time during the past five years to corn breeding. The idea has been to develop two varieties, one especially for the production of forage for green feed or silage, much needed in the dairy industry throughout Oregon; and another variety to produce an early maturing ear which will ripen and dry sufficiently to save and use for early fall feeding, or to pasture off with pigs, and that yet will give a yield of grain comparing favorably with other grains."

"Foundation stocks for these two purposes were developed in variety trials by the introduction of a number of the hardest and earliest maturing corns secured in different parts of the corn belt of the United States, the Minnesota No. 13 and the Minnesota No. 23 proving the best. They have been planted in separate fields, the best quality of high breeding being secured to begin with, and for two years individual plant selections have been made and ear row planting tests carried out. This resulted in marked improvement in the qualities of these varieties for Oregon conditions."

"The pedigree breeding will result in decided addition to the agricultural production of the state, it is believed. That these varieties are successful when tried is attested by the score of letters received requesting seed at any price. Prof. Hysion, who is working with me on the corn breeding, and I are persuaded that this is due entirely to the tested merits of the corn. In 1910 there were sent out small samples of the best seed to progressive farmers throughout the state for cooperative testing. It is the results of these tests which have created a demand for the seed last year and again this year far in excess of the ability of the college to satisfy it."

Municipal ownership of telephones became a possibility in San Francisco by a recent special election held in that city. The vote was cast defeating the proposed merger of the Home Telephone Co. and the Pacific Telephone and Telephone Co. 21,174 to 10,353, and calling for another special election to decide whether \$5,000,000 bonds shall be issued to purchase the Home Company.

PAISLEY VISITED BY JOURNAL MAN

Chewaucan Press: William L. Dav, editor and manager of the Northwest News, of Philadelphia, a paper published by the Northwest Townsite Company, arrived in Paisley last week. He is now busy securing data for an exhaustive write-up on the resources of this country in general and the Portland project in particular. Mr. Dav states that it is the wish of his company to ascertain just what crops can be successfully grown on the various sub-divisions of the segregation, so as to be in a position to advise the purchasers of water, thus saving the latter possible years of experimenting and loss of money. On the 12,000 acres of the segregation there are many different kinds of soil, varying from a light to a heavy, and in places considerable gravel. All of it is good for some kind of crop and the company will find out what that crop is. At the same time Mr. Dav will secure photographs and stories of things actually accomplished agriculturally in these two valleys and may expect to see a special feature in a future issue of the Northwest News.

O. A. C. IS MAKING CORN EXPERIMENTS

Results of the corn breeding work of the agronomy department at the Oregon Agricultural College are beginning to have their effect in practically every region of the state, although the experiments have not as yet been published. Although Oregon is a small grain growing state rather than a corn growing area, because of the cold nights and early fall rains, yet Prof. H. D. Scudder, head of the agronomy department, believes that a great deal may be done for this crop by breeding a harder, earlier maturing variety.

The corn crop in Oregon undoubtedly will never displace barley, as a feed for fattening hogs and other stock, yet it not only has great value for this purpose, especially where it may be matured off by oats without harvesting, but is even more valuable as a cultivation of the fields, not only to rid them of weeds which multiply in small grain or hay fields, but also for the excellent effects upon the physical qualities of the soil through thorough and frequent stirring. The corn is also valuable as a manure consumer, taking the place in the rotation in which the barnyard manure may be profitably used.

A study of western rivers by Geological Survey Engineers has developed the fact that many great water powers are still owned by the Government. A large number of power site withdrawals have been made by the president on the recommendation of the Geological Survey since May, 1909 when the first of these recommendations as made. The powers site withdrawals now outstanding aggregate 17,475.22 acres, distributed along the important streams of the western States. Reservoir withdrawals have also been made to the extent of 4,903 acres.

BURNING TULE IS HELD AS LAWFUL

Chewaucan Press: On Friday last the case of the state against A. F. Christen came up for hearing in the Justice's court. The defendant was charged by Game Warden La Sater with burning tules in the Chewaucan Marsh; where geese and ducks are accustomed to nest. There is a law on the statute books marking this a misdemeanor, but in the opinion of all who have studied the matter this law refers to government lands and not to private property. It would be a peculiar law that would put a penalty on the improvement of a man's land. The burning of these tules is absolutely necessary if a crop of hay is to be taken off in the summer, for a mower will certainly not cut through the old stocks. Mr. Christen is employed on the Z X ranch and was carrying out his orders when he set fire to them. The jury did not take long to consider a verdict, which was for acquittal, and Mr. Christen was discharged from custody.

Aviator Rogers Killed

Aviator Colbraith P. Rogers, who last fall secured quite a name as the first man to fly across the United States was almost instantly killed at Long Beach, the 3rd instant, in a flight over the ocean. After a number of daring feats he made a drop among a flock of sea gulls, failed to regain control, and dashed to the surface not 500 feet from the place where his transcontinental flight terminated last December.

McCall Loses Horse

The race horse, Fred M. belonging to Adin McCall, broke his neck Sunday afternoon while trying to head off another horse that had broken loose. Virgil McCall was riding him in the Conn field on the hill and when at top speed the horse stumbled and turned completely over. McCall cleared himself and landed about ten feet away. The horse's head was doubled under him, breaking his neck instantly and killing him. He was a valuable horse and McCall feels his loss keenly.—Chewaucan Press.

Towns Are Booming

Nevada State Journal: O. U. Metcalf of the Southern Pacific company has returned from a trip of inspection on the N.-C.-O. and reports that business conditions in the northern part of California and southern Oregon are in a very prosperous condition.

While on his trip Mr. Metcalf stopped at Alturas, Cal., and Lakeview, Oregon, and at both places met a number of people who have been at the new camp of High Grade and a large percentage of these believe that as soon as the snow melts and exposes the hillsides that a number of good prospects will be found.

The proposition of bonding San Francisco for \$3,000,000 for the purchase of land and erection of buildings in the proposed civic center recently carried by an overwhelming majority showing a 11 to 1 vote in its favor. This was the first election at which San Francisco women exercised their right of franchise and they formed a good percentage of visitors to the polls.
