GOOD FOR CORN

"In Eastern Oregon one of the greatest advantages of the corn crop is that it is a very low moisture consumer. and since it will permit thorough cultivation and moisture conservation, it may be used as a substitute crop in place of the summer fallow," said Prof. H. D. Seudder, head of the O.A. C. agronomy department in discussing the results of the corn treeding experiments at the college,

"This gives a return for the handling of the land," he continued, "getting rid of the weeds and leaving the ground in nearly as good a condition for the wheat eron to follow as would the costly summer fallow.

"In the irrigated sections of Eastern Oregon, and throughout the humid sections of Western Oregon, corn can be replaced by no other plant as a green feed in the late summer and as Lakeview, Oregon wilege throughout the winter. These facts have led the college to devote much time during the nest five years graphs and stories of things actually quittal, and Mr. Christen was dischargto corn breeding. The Idea has been to develou two variteties one especially for the production of forage for green feed or silsge, much needed in the dairy industry throughout Oregon: and another variety to produce an early maturing ear which will riper and dry sufficiently to save and use for early fell feeding, or to pasture off with ples, and that yet will give a yield of grain comparing favorably with other grains,

"Foundation stocks for these two purposes were developed in variety trials by the introduction of a number of the bardlest and earliest maturing corns secured in different parts of the corn belt of the United States, the Minnesots No. 13 and the Minnesots No. 23 proving the best. They have been planted in separate fields, the best quality of high breeding being secured to begin with, and for two years. individual plant selections have been made and ear row planting tests carried out. This resulted in marked imvarieties for Oreogn conditions.

"The pedigree breeding will result in decided addition to the agricultural when tried is attested by the score of letters received requesting seed at any price. Prof. Hystop, who is working with me on the corn breeding, and 1. are pursuaded that this is due entirely to the tested merits of the corn. In 1910 there were sent out small samples testing. It is the results of these tests which have created a gemand for the seed last year and again this year far to satify it."
