## FAVORABLE COMMENT ON THE HIGH GRADE

Exchanges Contain Glowing Accounts of Activities in the New Mining District, Which is so Rapidly Gaining Prominence in Mining Circles Throughout the Entire West

The High Grade Gold Mines Corporation starts out auspiciously, with a splendid property and a strong directorate, representative of the best in Cripple Creek and High Grade—shall we say the two greatest gold mines on the earth?

Klamath Falls Herald: A party of veteran miners of this city leave this evening to examine the New Pine Creek boom. The party consists of George W. Craven, George Gordon, George Schuknecht and S. B. Turner. It is said that there is a rich gold find in this location, and so assured of the matter have the discoverers that a party of Denver mining men of wealth, who have received assays of the find, are scheduled to arrive on the 16th inst. and go over the ground, with a view of starting work if they can buy the property. This point is fortified by the sale last week of the Sunshine mine, having gold properties, for the sum of \$100,000.

Fort Bidwell News: The first Denver, Colorado company to be organized under property in the camp of High Grade is named after the camp itself—The High Grade Gold Mines Corporation. It will take over the Gold Peak and Klondike claims, which everyone here knows are two of the most promising properties in the camp.

The High Grade Gold Mines Corporation is a Wyoming Company, with a capital stock of 15,000,000 shares par value one dollar a share. The president is Albert Wagner of Denver, Colorado, a well known and successful mining man who has a wide experience in American and Mexican camps. He was formerly General Manager of the Pharmacist Company of Cripple Creek, Colorado—the first dividend payer of that camp.

The Vice President of the company is understood to be J. F. Cutler, Manager of the Modoc Mines Company of High Grade, and one of our foremost operators, who, by the way is backed by a mater of twenty-six years practical experience.

N. E. Guyot "The Father of High Grade," will be one of the directors, which spells a whole lot for the company for as everybody knows N. E. is "all gold and a yard wide," and what he does not know about real mining for the golden profits is really hardly worth knowing.

Another director, we are informed is A. L. "Gus" Arnold, the well known Cripple Creek man, who for years min-

ed and dealt in stocks in "The Great Gold Camp," and also acted as secretary to the Cripple Creek Mine Owners Association. Old timers in the camp remember the Arnold boys in connection with the Abe Lincoln mine in Poverty Gulch, which has of late years developed into one of the bonanzas of that district.

To date the development on the properties acquired has amounted to a 60-foot shaft on the Gold Peak. If the showing here is kept up in the other workings on the property, the new company will certainly have plenty in the matter of ore, for the entire shaft is now in material good for at least \$12 to the ton which everybody knows is a good grade of pay dirt. The theory has been advanced that the Gold Peak is an ore chimney and it will unquestionably prove a very heavy producer of mill ore, with the probability that high grade deposits will be opened with development.

Klamath Falls Herald: J. Scott Taylor, the Klamath Falls newspaper man who recently went on a tour of inspection to High Grade, near New Pine Creek, where the new mining development is located, will start a paper there according to a report which has reached this city.

Mining men are hurrying into the new mining district a few miles from here. All the places where men are able to obtain board and a place to sleep are taken, with many going to Lakeview, fifteen miles north of here, for places to stop. Real estate is changing hands daily, and some rare buys have been recorded. "Dutch Jake" Miller, a Nevada mining man, has purchased the Lake Hotel, and will immediately remodel it.

New Pine Creek is on the Oregon California state line. The "High Grade" District is within a few miles of the town and runs to near Fort Bidwell on the east, a distance across the hills as the crow flies, of about fifteen miles. The highly mineralized belt runs from a point about fifteen miles south of New Pine Creek to six or seven miles north of the state line.

The larger population at present is on the Oregon side of the line. The hills wherein the claims are located are from 500 to 1,500 feet above the town, which lies about the center of the lake of the same name.

The hills are well wooded, thus furnishing fuel and timber for mining,

while stored on the higher points and in the various ravines are large quantities of snow that furnish an abundance of pure water all the year.

Goose Lake Valley on the west of the district and Surprise Valley on the east are among the most fertile bodies of land in the two states, and within a few miles of the mines is the famous orchard belt of the Goose Lake country.

The Nevada-California-Oregon railway follows the shore of the lake and has established a depot there, and is preparing to handle a large volume of traffic between Reno, Nevada, and Goose Lake Valley points, the terminus being Lakeview, the county seat of Lake county. Many of the claims have been worked for several years, and the deepest shaft is 172 feet, in the "Sunshine."

Nevada State Journal: With a newspaper experience marked by the fact that he established the first paper in Cripple Creek when that camp was at about the same state of development as the one he is bound for, E. Chapin Gard of the Colorado camp is in Reno and will leave this morning for High Grade, Cal., to establish the first paper in that new camp.

Mr. Gard states that he will christen the first paper the High Grader and naturally expects to do a profitable business in the new camp and predicts a great rush of Colorado prospectors and miners within the next few weeks when the weather conditions will be favorable to work.

T. F. Duganway of the N.-C.-O. has sent out a party of engineers to survey and plat a townsite to be called Pine Creek, Cal. The new town will be one and one half miles from New Pine Creek, Ore., and will be the closest point to the railroad and the camp.

Nevada State Journal: The N.-C.-O. train to the north yesterday morning carried a large crowd of gold seekers and capitalists interested in the strikes at High Grade including a party numbering 117 composed of men from San Francisco, Los Angeles, New York and Denver. The railroad officers declare that the rush to the new camp is well under way and that High Grade will be the scene of great excitement this spring.

The latest news of the transfer of the property is that the Alice Roosevelt claim which adjoins the Sunshine and Mountain Sheep claims, has been sold to W. H. O'Neil for a large sum. The claim has a 200-foot tunnel with

large quantities of high grade ore sacked whose value is given as ranging from \$100 to \$15,000 a ton.

Klamath Falls Northwestern: The new mining camp of High Grade, five miles from New Pine Creek and just over the Oregon line in California, is attracting a large number of Klamath Falls people, several of whom are making preparations to visit the mining camp. Two of our citizens are already on the ground and are anxiously awaiting word from them before making any move to visit the place. New Pine Creek is about 120 miles from here and according to reports promises to be one of the greatest mining camps in the northwest. About this new gold discovery the Lakeview Examiner says:

On Wednesday of last week the Seven-Thirty Gold Mining Company, was organized and is to be incorporated under the California law with the home office of the company at New Pine Creek, California. This Company will own and operate three claims, something like fifty-four acres of the most centrally located ground in the High Grade camp and with development, on other properties on every side and a splendid showing on the Seven-Thirty ground. The future of this new organization is said to be a very flattering one.

James Llewellyn accompanied by Charles L. Fulton, both of Los Angeles, arrived in New Pine Creek on Sunday's train. Mr. Fulton is a mining man and oil promoter and has come to take up options on some mining ground which was secured for him by Llewellyn, some thirty days ago.

The boom is on in the High Grade camp, not anything can stop the onrush of miners and prospectors to this district and it is one that will not collapse once the elements will have removed the snow, and the new comer will then be able to see so much high grade ore in some places in many different properties that we almost hesitate to forecast the future of the District and the vicinity surrounding it.

Reno Evening Gazette: A chinook has been blowing for several days in the northern country and the sun has been adding to its efforts to dissipate the snow. As a consequence the High Grade District is now not only reached but there are opportunities to prospect after getting there.

The rush in that direction has begun and promises to develop into a regular stampede. There were two carloads of rushers on the northbound N.-C.-O. train this morning.
