WILL BALLOT ON U. OF O. PETITIONS

Salem, Oregon, April 23.-Reversing Judge Galloway, of the Circuit Court three young women-went joy riding of Marion County, the Supreme Court, in a western city, late at night recentin an opinion by Justice Burnett has dismissed the University of Oregon referendum cases and by so doing practically ruled that the referendum petitions must go on the ballot to be voted on by the people at the next general

The court ruled entirely on the question of procedure in bringing the suit and ignored the issue as to whether there was fraud in the petitions or as to the correct method of determining the validity of the petitions. The ruling is, in effect, that S. H. Friendly, a private individual, who appears to be the plaintiff, had no right to bring the suit. The action is therefore dismissed. Nor does the court indlcate how the suit or any proceeding against a referendmm should have been brought.

The present case involves more than \$328,000, but by stipulation the full import of the opinion involves more than \$500,000 of appropriations made by the

last Legislature for the university. The main question arose under the general demurrer. The question there was whether the plaintiff, by his bill in equity, stated facts sufficient to sup-

port his prayer for relief. The Supreme Court holds that S. H. Friendly, as plaintiff, does not show that he will be injured in any property or civil right by the contemplated action of Secretary of State Olcott in certifying the ballot title to the County Clerks.

"Neither will his political right to vote on the measure at the election be infringed," states the opinion in referring to the planitiff, Friendly. "He can then, as always, exercise his electoral franchise unaffected by anything shown in the bill.

"If he can enjoin the Secretary of State now, he can sue out a writ the Filling In Exposition Site day before that officer would certify to the ballot title, and thus balk the whole people in the exercise of their constitutional reserve power to reject any law passed by the Legislative As-

"The principal is sound and well settled, that as against public officers. where their action involves purely publie or political rights, the drastic remedy of injunction can be involked only by the state acting through its proper law officer. . . . To sustain plaintiff's suit when he shows no injury to his private rights would be a pronounced example of a government by injunction.

A WARNING MES-**SAGE TO PARENTS**

A party of six-three young men and ly. It was a clandestine ride, and the "little supper" they had by the way was also clandestine. The news of the accident spread rapidly and before morning 130 inquiries filed at police headquarters, by the distracted parents of young girls who did not know where their wandering daughters were that

The trouble with a lot of parents is that they assume that because "None of the girls in our tamily ever went astray," that none of them ever will: that good, old-fashioned God-fearing discipline is not needed for them. that because her "mother always took care of berself," that therefore the girl will likely take care of herselt. These presumptions are as likely to be untrue as not. It is a fact, anyhow, that the recruits for joy riders in questionable company and for the bagnios later on frequently come from excellent families with lax standards of discipline.

And what is equally true and torbidding fact is that the laws of hereditary and prenatality are no respectors of the "best families," which sometimes contribute to the lewd and criminal classes. It is only evidence that "best families" during the generations preceding this, and yet earlier generations, knew no more than many of the best families of this generation, because the proportion of recruits for the underworld was as large in the past as at present.

All of which also applies when the boys get out of the straight and narrow way, and should be just as much a matter of concern.-Exchange.

The work of filling in 72 acres of swamp or over flow lands on the Harbor View site for the Panama-Paicfic International Exposition is now under way. The giant dredger "John Me-Mullen"owned by the San Francisco Bridge Company is now pumping mud on to the flats and will continue to do so for the next three or four months.
