CAMP CONQUERS; LIARS REBUKED

PROFESSOR STORMS PRAISES HIGH GRADE

Issues A Warning Against Fake Promoters And Promises to Visit New Pine Creek And The Entire District

(High Grade News)

In all the history of mining, a new camp has never received more contemptible, vicious and cowardly attacks than have been trained against the district of High Grade by a bunch of fakery, self-styled "mining experts" and bum mining editors, not one of whom with a single exception has ever been in the camp and who have dreamed their dope on High Grade on the long distance wire and peddled it out to the public in idiotic drivel.

All of the famous old camps have been subject to this style and system of vilification. Cripple Creek was crowded on the map in the face of bitter denunciation by state officials, mining editors and mining experts.

The recent piratical assaults on Camp High Grade are proving a boomerang as well as noted by the action taken by the New Pine Creek Commercial Club. At a called meeting of the club Friday evening of last week a committee was appointed to take action on the numerous libels recently published against the camp and giving state Mineralogist W. H. Storms of California as authority for such unjust action. This committee formulated and addressed the following letter to Prof. Storms for information.

New Pine Creek, Ore., May 6, 1912.
Hon. W. H. Storms,
State Mineralogist State of California, San Francisco, Cal.

Dear Sir: Conforming with the duties imposed upon us by the New Pine Creek Commercial Club, and to still the growing animosity which has arisen and is developing in the minds of the populace of this community concerning certain published statements attributed to you reflecting unfavorably and grossly misrepresenting the true conditions of the High Grade mining district, we ask that you give us your reasons and the basis for such accredited statements. Certainly you have not visited the camp. Do so and your mind will be equipped with material for a most favorable report.

We believe that justice should prevail and that you will assist in developing the resources of this district, assuming that the geological conditions are right and that the mineral is here in paying quantities. In our minds there is no longer any doubt relative to gold existing here in quantities. We believe you will say as much when you visit the camp, see the ore and study the underground workings of the Modoc, Last Dollar, Sunshine, Big Four, Mountain Sheep, Alturas, Consolidated and Sunset mines.

Eliminating our knowledge and opinions of High Grade we respectfully refer you to, and ask that you secure copies of the reports of such eminent mining authorities as George J. Bancroft, of Denver; Norman Stines, now consulting engineer for a Russian mining syndicate; George A. Ayres, and A. C. Lowell, and in addition one of the most glowing mining reports as we have ever read, by Algernon Del-Mar. We desire to give ourselves the pleasure of transmitting your reply or report to the New Pine Creek Commercial Club that justice may be done and the damaging statements discredited.

This, of course, will not correct the misconception of this camp inspired by the articles which appeared in the San Francisco Chronicle and Call, Denver Post, Cripple Creek Times and the Mining and Scientific Press, and which quote you freely. Your relations to the development of the mineral resources of the great state of California surely are identical with the interests, desires and hopes of the hundreds of mining men now in High Grade and waiting on its borders to exploit its mineral possibilities. We shall await and appreciate an early reply.

Your favor of May 6, received this morning. I am sending you copies of the only things that have been published over my name in reference to High Grade. I wish you to observe carefully that I say nothing as to the actual value of the mines of High Grade, but merely caution would be investors to investigate before turning over money to promoters. I have taken this stand on these grounds as indicated in the publications referred to.

When the snows began to fall early last winter, there was no reason for a stampede to High Grade.
