Before investing his own money in High Grade he spent three months in the camp carefully looking it over. He took no man's word for anything; then he got busy and has been busy ever since having secured four great properties in the district.

Mr. Branley was largely instrumental and active in the organization of the New Pine Creek Commercial Club and in maintaining and increasing interest and enthusiasm in that body.

The new building now under construction at First and California streets under his supervision is to be a branch office of the Seven Lakes company.

THIS CAMP SHOWS RICH DEPOSITS

Epitome Of What There is And Where It is Located

(By J. Scott Taylor.) (High Grade News)
That the High Grade mining district contiguous to New Pine Creek is the greatest which has been discovered since Cripple Creek is the unanimous opinion of experienced mining men who have recently visited this district and investigated the showings made here.

In this district the same formation is found that exists in the greatest mining districts in Colorado. On the Discovery property there is a three-foot vein of ore 200 feet long on the surface which averages from \$12 to \$14 per ton and in this is a considerable amount of the richest quartz which will run over \$200 per ton in gold.

On another vein on this property the owners have sunk a 30-foot shaft from which they have taken half a car load of white quartz which averages \$40 per ton. A large porphyry dike which makes to the east of this vein is itself a large body of low milling ore.

Up the hill from the Discovery is the Sunset. On a large open cut and surface tunnel on this property are exposed a thousand tons of ore running from \$5 to \$500 per ton in gold. Samples taken from the great masses of oxidized ore returned better than \$31 per ton and assays of the unoxidized ore shows results running very high in gold.

In Sunset gulch, at the base of Discovery Hill, there is a Lane type Chilean mill with a capacity of from 20 to 40 tons per day. Directly opposite Discovery Hill is the group of claims owned by the Ft. Bidwell Consolidated Gold Mining company. On the Sugar Pine lode of this property at a depth of about 200 feet below the surface at the end of a 400-foot tunnel they are breaking four feet of ore, which is known to extend to the surface which will average over \$18.00 per ton in gold.

From 30 to 40 tons of this ore was crushed per day for six months last summer in the company's stamp mill, yielding about 60 per cent of the values. The mill is not as yet equipped with concentrators and the tailings all run into a sump which it is intended to treat later by cyanide.

In the Mountain View property on the 150-foot level an eight-inch vein of greenish quartz shows average values of \$147.00 per ton in gold with a little silver.

On the Big Four property to the north a rhyolite dike, which has been changed to quartz, projects to an elevation of 150 feet above the surface and is 100 feet wide and of unknown length. The entire mass, according to Norman Stines, now in charge of extensive mines in Russia and who was in this district two years ago and examined the camp thoroughly for six months, averages \$4.79 in gold and is free milling.

The amount of ore exposed in this dike on the property is fully 100,000 tons. Assays of this ore have run from \$2.00 to \$60.00 per ton, while in the tunnels and shafts of the property 12 and 15-inch veins average better than \$40.00 per ton.

A half mile north of the Big Four is the Sunshine and although no large veins have been opened up on this property the 8-inch vein in the bottom of the 22-foot shaft averages \$1,000 per ton, while veins of about the same width in the 40-foot shaft and 200-foot tunnel average \$200 per ton.

The most northerly property in the district is that of the Modoc Mines Co., and 18 inches of the three-foot wide vein in their 35-foot shaft averages between \$40 and \$50 per ton.

From this showing it would appear that the High Grade district is entitled to some attention and the prediction is freely made that some very remarkable developments will occur in the district during the present season.

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C. A. Howard Here (High Grade News)

C. A. Howard, a veteran mining man with extensive experiences in Colorado, Utah, Nevada and other western states, has spent the last two months in the High Grade mining district representing Los Angeles capital.

Mr. Howard has made extensive and critical examinations of the developed mines of that camp. He has prospected the hills in different directions studying the general geology of the country. He has been on both sides of the range, to the Windy Hollow district on the north and to Willow Ranch and Pandango camps on the south, and as a result he has formed a very favorable opinion of High Grade district and the Warner range of mountains in general and states that it is an extensive and most promising field for prospecting when the snow disappears and that High Grade will develop into a rich mining district.
