here Tuesday. THE PLANT LICE Final examinations for the pupils of the eighth grade were held last week at the local Grammer school.

Corvallis Uregon, May, 15 .- Plant lice are playing havoc wth rose bushes, currants and various garden crops this season, and A. L. Lovett, assistant entomologist at the Oregon Agricutural pest.

TO EXTERMINATE

On currant bushes the work of the galls on the leaves, discolored a deep reddish hue. On the under side of the leaf are found many small, pale green, soft bodied insects with their beaks inserted in the plant tissues, busy sapping the plant juices. On the roses the lice are found about the stems of the leaf and flower buds. Later the flowers will be misshapen and smaller than normal.

A contact spray should be used, and its effectiveness depends entirely on its being used thoroughly in such a way that it actually reaches the body of the insect. 
