The first was on the occasion of a called meeting of the New Pine Creek Commercial club on Thursday night, May 2, to welcome Mr. Guyot and Harry Newton, editor of the Daily Mining Record of Denver, and to tender the thanks to the club to them for the interest they have taken in the High Grade district and the influence they have exerted in its behalf.

The second was the demonstration that greeted him when he responded to a call by a meeting of the miners and prospectors of the district to address them Wednesday night. COLORADO COIN FOR HIGH GRADE

Centennial State to Start Tent City and Develop the Mines

(High Grade News)

J. C. Ramage, of Denver, Col., arrived in camp Saturday as advance agent for a Colorado syndicate formed to operate extensively in the High Grade district.

Mr. Ramage received two car loads of freight from his company at the N.-C.-O. depot Monday consisting of tents and other camp equipment which will be used by the syndicate during the summer season.

A tent city will be established as soon as F. H. Mitchell, the principal factor in this enterprise, arrives from Denver. The location of this nomad metropolis has, as yet, not been determined. It will be unique and interesting in many particulars. It will be preliminary to a permanent, substantial town to be erected later on. The company has already become interested in some of the best mines on the hill and will begin developing them at once.

WILD STAMPEDE TO GOLD BASIN

A New District Looming Up South of New Pine Creek

(High Grade News)

Already a promising mineral belt has been discovered at the western base of the Warner range and several dozen prospectors are busy opening properties there. The new district has been christened Gold Basin, because of the topography of the country and the surprising gold values returned from its ores.

The district has been known to the residents of Goose Lake valley for many years and prospecting has been done there at intervals for a quarter of a century. The formation is similar to that of Gold Basin proper, excepting that the dikes and veins at Greenhorn are more exposed and more clearly defined. Values are about the same.

Camp Gold Basin is located five miles south of New Pine Creek on the western slope of Warner range near the valley and only two miles from the N.-C.-O. railroad. The new camp is a surprise to old timers and to the hundreds of mining men now coming into the Warner range. No prospector ever struck his pick into finer looking prospects. Great ledges standing out like long, straight walls, mineralized and colored by oxidation, contacts and fissure veins filled with quartz and talc to the grass roots, much of it resounding in plentiful colors of gold when panned.

Among the best properties in the new camp is the Big Blizzard owned by Wm. Mears and Pat Gallagher. A tunnel has been driven on the vein 175 feet. A small streak of free milling gold ore is now exposed in the breast of the tunnel. Work is being prosecuted vigorously on this property. The Fairview lodes Nos. 1 and 2 are grouped with the Big Blizzard.

The Mammoth group, owned by Wm. Burgun, Wm. Mears and others, is a net work of huge dikes and fissures, well mineralized from the surface and increasing in value as depth is attained. Mining men unanimously predict that the Mammoth is the making of a great mine.

Dustin, Gentry, Smith and Belcher have several fine looking claims in Gold Basin. The Bonnie is one of the most promising claims in the district. Work is being pushed on this property.

Some of the properties in this district return surprising values in silver and much of the ore contains bromide of silver, giving it the appearance of azurite copper ore.

A. D. Lisonbee and H. J. Mears own the Blue Grouse Nos. 1 and 2 and the Golden Eagle on Pleasant Hill. The dike is twenty feet across and the contact material pans strings of gold two inches long.

D. M. Mahoney and John Snyder operating the Red Lead Nos. 1 and 2 and the Nellie May lodes. The ore pans well. Mr. Mahoney also owns the White Lead in the same locality.
