### Peculiar Combination

(High Grade News)

On the table of the News office is a display of mineral specimens from Camp High Grade and potatoes from Goose Lake Valley; also a string of speckled beauties from Lawson Creek and a mammoth spray of peach, pear, apple and apricot blooms from orchards adjoining the town.

The mineral is sealed with gold and silver, the studs are of the "Mortgage Lifter," and Russet varieties produced by D. W. Thomas near the N.-C.-O. depot. They are whoppers belonging in the class A category. The fish are rainbow and lake trout lured to our table by the wiles of Nelson Rounsvelt, champion fish fender of the world, and the fruit blooms come from the orchard of Harry Aldridge, our worthy assistant postmaster.

This display is as interesting from a commercial standpoint as it is unique. It clearly demonstrates the resources and possibilities of the Warner range and the valleys on either side, the region of splendid promise, of magnificent opportunities, of mineral wealth untold, of soil the fertility and energy of which passes all understanding, of the region where dreams come true.

### Alaska In Line

(High Grade News)

N. T. Cory and Julius Papke started Tuesday on an extended prospecting trip. They intend to go to the Windy Hollow country and from there work along the eastern side of the Warner mountains towards the High Grade district following the snow as it disappears. Mr. Cory was among the first of the stamperers to the Klondike and has spent a number of years in the Yukon territory and Alaska. Mr. Papke is also an Alaskan "Sourdough." ### Party of Wealthy People To Visit The Great Gold Camp

(High Grade News)

Plans to bring a mammoth excursion of wealthy people into Camp High Grade from all parts of the country were practically agreed upon at meeting in Wendt's Hall Thursday night. The matter will be farther discussed at the meeting of the Commercial club next Wednesday night.

The enterprise was proposed by the News, and will be conducted under the auspices of the newspaper publishers, officers of commercial bodies and boosters in Fort Bidwell, Alturas, New Pine Creek and Lakeview, all of whom are appointed special committeemen to get busy, attend Wednesday night's meeting and aid in making of this excursion a grand success. Excursionists will be escorted to all the towns mentioned and to the mines of High Grade without favoritism.

### Commercial Club

At the age of fifteen he drove a six course Concord Coach from Red Rock, Montana into Salmon City, Idaho.
