MANY MEASURES TO BE VOTED ON

The Number Will Surpass Those in the Last Election

Oregon voters in the November election this year will be called upon to pass on at least 40 measures, submitted under either the initiative or the referendum, in addition to electing President, Vice President, United States Senator, Representatives in Congress and various state and county officers. The number will surpass those in the general election two years ago, when the total was only 32.

Of the 40 measures already in sight, and the time for filing initiative measures with the Secretary of State, not expiring until July 4, six have been referred to the people by the 1911 session of the Legislature. They consist of proposed constitutional amendments as follows: Creating the office of Lieutenant-Governor, three measures on taxation eliminating from the constitution, the single tax plank that was adopted by the people two years ago, requiring an affirmative vote of a majority of the total number of votes cast in the election before any amendment to the constitution, proposed under the initiative, shall become operative; making stockholders in banking corporations liable to pay for the benefit of depositors an amount equal to the par value of stock held by any stockholder in addition to having originally paid the par value therefor.

The referendum has been invoked on three other measures enacted by the last Legislature. Two of these are known as the University of Oregon appropriation bills, giving the state institution at Eugene additional funds to the amount of \$503,258.92. The third is Senator Marey's public service commission bill.

An initiative bill already in file in the Secretary of State's office for a constitutional amendment giving women the right of suffrage.

In addition to the six good roads bills drafted by Governor West's "harmony commission," the State Grange will resort to the initiative and propose two bills prescribing a method for highway construction. Petitions for all eight measures are now being circulated throughout the state for signatures.
