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## LAKEVIEW MAN SPREADS GOSPEL

V. L. Snelling Tells People of Reno The Good Things That We Have Got Here

Nevada State Journal: V. L. Snelling, of Lakeview, Oregon better known as the "Mark Twain of Southern Oregon," is a Reno visitor, and between times is spending his odd moments bosting his home section and telling of the great agricultural opportunities to be found there.

Mr. Snelling is one of the pioneer residents of Southern Oregon, and naturally is somewhat optimistic over conditions as they exist around his home regions. He is interested in the new town of Fairport, situated about fifteen miles south of Lakeview on Sunset Lake. The new town is located on the Nevada-California-Oregon railroad, and is about centrally located on the lake, which is about forty miles in length and from eight to ten miles in width.

Fairport is on the east side of the lake and is surrounded by many new farms. Approximately 6000 acres of grounds are now under cultivation, and new acreages are being added to this total daily.

On the west side of the lake over 50,000 acres of land is to be had, suitable for tilling and the raising of almost any variety of crops. In addition experts declare that over two billion feet of lumber is to be had from the timber forests necessary to the contemplated mill. Heretofore but little attention has been paid to the timber reserves on account of the lack of transportation, but with the N.-C.-O. line extended through that vicinity, capitalists are now contemplating the erection of a mill.

A pier will be erected at Fairport shortly and water transportation will prove a big feature in the progress of that district. Practically every foot of the land bordering on the lake is suitable for agricultural purpose and the water transportation will be resorted to by all farmers. Fairport is so centrally located that it will prove to be the hub of the new district. Mr. Snelling stated last evening that Lake county was one of the richest counties in Oregon. There is more wealth per capita within the county than in any other county in the state. In substantiating his assertion he said that if the total amount as shown by the assessment roll was to be divided by the total number of persons in Lake county every man, woman and child would be credited with \$24.

The county has \$64,000 court house, while a \$60,000 high school building has just been completed at Lakeview.

In addition the Heryford brothers are building a \$100,000 modern three story steel and brick business building.

The N.-C.-O. railroad will shortly commence the construction of a \$11,000 depot at Fairport and Mr. Snelling predicts that the new town will soon become one of the business localities in that section.

Homeseekers are arriving in great numbers in Lake county and Mr. Snelling stated that the number for the last year. The last three or four years has witnessed the arrival of a great number of new residents, while prior to that time the arrival of homeseekers was scarcely noticeable.

After spending several days in Reno transacting business that necessitated presence here, Mr. Snelling will return to his home community, and continue to grow up with that fast growing section.
