Road to New Town Opened From Pine Creek and Ft. Bidwell

Branley occupies a central position and convenient location. It is the midway point between New Pine Creek and Ft. Bidwell. The road was opened into it from both places this week by snow shoveler. WORK BEGINS IN FAIRY FAIRPORT

Transformation of the Sunset Valley into a Garden of Eden

The signal has sounded in the ring of the hammer and rasp of saw, and the transformation of a great ranch into one of the grandest, most beautiful, interesting, attractive and desirable resort towns in the West has begun.

Piling is arriving for the construction of a pier to extend 300 feet into Sunset lake from the shore near the new passenger depot of the N.-C.-O. Railroad. Lumber is unloading for N. C. There are 47,000 acres of irrigated land, vast fields and herds and flocks and two billion feet of available lumber on the West Side which this new enterprise will bring to Fairport for shipment.
