prescribed in Sec. 3144 L. O. L. which is \$2.00 per day and mileage at the rate of 10 cents per mile each way; also the cost of the board, from, and vehicle for conveying said prisoner to his destination.

The amounts incurred by P. D. Reeder, as special constable with the exception of "meals of defendant, \$100" should be disallowed for the reason that he was acting in his capacity as Deputy Sheriff and the same should be borne by that office as hereinafore given.

The claim of Mrs. F. W. Remington for \$5.25 for board bill offices in case of State vs. C. E. Shaffer is disallowed for the reason that board bills are not a legal claim, except for prisoners, while under arrest.

**A NEVADA OPINION OF NEW TOWNSINE**

**Fairport Receives Praise From Reliable and Important Source**

(High Grade News)

Nevada State Journal: A new town on the N.-C.-O. has been named by a reader of The Journal. When the railroad, the general offices of which are located in this city, decided to lay out the new town, the subscribers of The Journal were asked to suggest a name for it. More than 500 complied. The name of Fairport, submitted by one subscriber, was accepted and the town will be known by that name in the future.

Sunset Lake, on the banks of which the new town is located, is one of the most picturesque in the west. Reno men who have been instrumental in bringing about so many improvements in that section, are behind the new town, and will push it to the front.

A pier 300 feet long will be built out into the water, and improvements of a substantial character are to be made that will attract attention to this place.

The country about Sunset Lake is famous for its horticultural products. The fruits from the orchards of the Sunset or Goose Lake Valley region are known well and favorably. The place is protected from the chill winds and while frosts have occurred in many other sections, the blossoms of the Sunset region have not been damaged, and all indications point to the fact that the fruit crop will be of the bumper character this year.

It is the intention of the men behind the enterprise to out a large tract up in the orchards, and to bring in a number of settlers, to the end that the new town will be one of the busiest places along the line of the N.-C.-O.

The soil is volcanic ash, and is splendidly adapted to the growing of fruit. It is predicted that this section, within a short time will become fully as famous as the Rogue River, Hood River or North Yakima.

The new town will not depend, however, on the horticultural resources, for tributary to it there are nearly 50,000 acres of the finest kind of agricultural lands.

Within nine miles there is a stand of 2,000,000,000 feet of lumber. The tilting of the land the felling of the trees and the development of the orchard tracts will make of the new town one of the best known along the line of the road.

In addition, there are the mineral resources of the country now undergoing such rapid development. The new camp of High Grade is located near here. Some of the best known mining men of the west are on the ground and have interested themselves in this section.

The work of prospecting and development is in progress there at the present time.

This camp has had the effect of attracting a great many people to that section, whom are favorably impressed with the county.

A depot and hotel, together with other buildings, is to be erected by the N.-C.-O. R. R., and with other structures, among which is the big pier, a building boom of importance will be inaugurated the promises to make it one of the best cities in that section of California tributary to Reno.

**RICH STRIKE IN FAIRVIEW LODGE**

J. P. Branley Opens Im-mense Body on Seven Lakes Property

(High Grade News)

At the breast of the tunnel in the Fairview, one of the Seven Lakes group on Yellow Mountain, J. P. Branley, the local manager, has broken into a body of white and yellow honey-combed quartz resembling ore from the recent strike in the Bg Four, which adjoins this property.

Eleven different veins radiate from a common center in this property only fifteen feet from the breast of the tunnel. The strike has created much interest in the district. It is a practical demonstration of the absolute merits of the camp under fair, honest and systematic operations. It is proof that High Grade is a real mining district of unquestioned deposits of gold. It silences the hammer of the knocker and the croak of the pessimist and piker. It sets to rest forever all doubt as to the future of High Grade.

The magnitude of the ore body cannot at this time be even conjectured. No man can see beyond the point of his pick. The strike is only 80 feet under the surface. It is in the center of a great fissure and contact area. Great mines are on all sides, some of them among the best in the district, and the Fairview is seeming common a center for a vast network of veins.

Mr. Branley takes his good luck modestly. He is a practical man of good common sense. His property is always open to inspection to the public. There is no concealment of property or purpose with him. He is in High Grade to mine and to ship ore. He will make a trial shipment from the Fairview soon and if that does not pay he will make another, but he is certain that it will pay for the start.

It will only require a few Branleys in the district to place Camp High Grade on the map properly.
