COUNCIL IS CAPABLE

One objection raised against the adoption of a sewerage system at this time, is that the members of the council have never had any previous experience in sewer construction. We must acknowledge that we fail to see the force of this argument. It would be impossible to secure a council of five members from the citizens of Lakeview who have had such experience. All that is necessary for the council to do is to employ a competent engineer to draw the plans and specifications, and after the contracts are let, to employ an engineer and inspectors to see that the contract and specifications are carried out. Every month this engineer would make a statement to the council that the contractor had done a certain amount of work and was entitled to so much money according to the contract, which the council would authorize the treasurer to pay. The plan of payment adopted is so simple that when the work is done that it would be an easy matter for any citizen of the town to calculate the proper cost of the work for himself. The council has already accomplished the most important feature connected with the sewerage system. From the business like manner in which they procured the complete and detailed plans for the work to be done, we believe they will use the same good judgment in performing the necessary duties after the bonds have been voted. At any rate the fact remains that the present council was put into office by a big majority of the votes of the citizens of the town, principally for this very purpose. On the sewerage question they have lived up to their obligation in such a manner as to justify the confidence placed in them.

At the last election the citizens of Lakeview showed that they wanted a sewerage system and that they wanted this council to build it, and the Examiner believes the town will vote the necessary bonds to carry it out.

No organization in a community is of more importance than the band. It is always a true guide to the progressiveness of any city. The remark is often over heard to come from visitors: "This town is a live one, and is full of good enterprising people and has a rattling good band—best I ever heard for its size. All of which merely goes to show that any locality is judged largely by the company of musicians it keeps. Boost for your band, it represents to the outside world what you are and where you're at.

Oregon will be urged to adopt a law, in conserving livestock and to increase production of cattle in particular, forbidding the slaughter of a heifer or female calf for three years, unless the animal is by nature made incapable of propagation. All other states of the Union will be requested to adopt similar measures, as a result of the draft of statute accepted by the National Stock Exchange Association, just before it adjourned its annual convention.

FARMERS SHOULD EXHIBIT PRODUCTS

Urged to Make Displays on Exhibit Cars and at Dry Farming Congress

Dr. E. D. Everett, secretary of the Lakeview Commercial Club, is in receipt of a letter from C. C. Chapman, secretary of the Portland Commercial Club, urging that some method be adopted to get the farmers of this section to make exhibits of their products at all the big Land Shows, Railroad Exhibit Cars and at the Dry Farming Congress. "Unless you send us the samples you will not get the publicity," says Mr. Chapman. He says to gather all products in the proper season, and that he will furnish shipping directions later, the thing to do now is to get available products ready for shipment. "This is one of the best means for advertising a country. Lake County is capable of sending in good exhibits and she should be represented at these public displays. It not only affords the producer to advertise the country by furnishing these exhibits, but it affords a chance to advertise his own individual farm by labeling the product with his own name and the place where it was grown.

Gypsy Wordless Language.

To communicate with one another gypsies now use letters—and they use the telegraph, too, when necessary—especially in this country. But the modern Romany also follows the "patteran," tracing the footsteps or wagon tracks of his friends on the road by the same method employed by his ancient prototype, reading directions where no words are written as clearly as the gorgio does a roadside signboard. But the patteran can be read by the gypsy only—it is hidden and secret, although it may be in plain sight, as a signboard is open and public. The patteran may be formed of sticks or stones or grass placed cross fashion at the parting of roads in such manner that only a gypsy would instantly notice and understand. To him it means much—first of all, the direction taken by Romany predecessors.—Century Magazine.

The Hungarian Crown.

The Hungarian crown worn at their accession by the emperors of Austria as kluks of Hungary is the identical one made for Stephen and used at his coronation over 800 years ago. The whole is of pure gold, except the settings, and weighs almost exactly fourteen pounds. The settings above alluded to consist of fifty-three sapphires, fifty rubies, one emerald and 338 pearls. It will be noticed that there are no diamonds among these precious adornments. This is accounted for by the oft quoted story of Stephen's aversion to such gems because he considered them "unlucky."

The canal now will be finished before that date according to the expectation of the engineers. Dr. W. R. Boyd, who last week returned from an extended trip to Port-
