## GAME LAWS ARE TO BE REVISED

### Commission Desires Public Opinion for a New Revision

The State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners have undertaken a thorough revision of the present system of the game laws. The idea is to present a code for adoption at the next Legislature, which will give more complete protection to fish and game and correct numerous errors in the present system of laws.

The Commission desires in making up this new game code to get thorough expression of public opinion before the code is presented to the Legislature. For this reason the members of the Commission ask that residents in different parts of the State, especially farmers, fruit growers, as well as sportsmen send suggestions so that the Commission may act upon them. Suggestions are also sought from the granges, commercial bodies, rod and gun clubs and other organizations, in order to get a game code suitable for different parts of the State.

All communications and suggestions should be sent to Mr. J. F. Hughes, of the Fish and Game Commission, Salem, Oregon.

At present there are number questions under discussion that will be of interest to sportsmen in different parts of the State, such as the question of bounties on predatory animals. The Commission is in favor of a more rigid effort to exterminate cougar and wolves. The question has been agitated in certain parts of the state to reduce the non-resident hunting and fishing license to the same price as the resident license. Many sportsmen are also in favor of reducing the limits on deer and other game.

## MUTT AND JEFF ARE OREGONIANS

Mutt's Prototype is Tom Stevens, Jeff's was Scotty Ferguson

People who have enjoyed many a laugh over the funny and clever cartoons of Mutt and Jeff will be surprised to learn that the original Mutt is a native Douglas county man and that of Jeff a former livery man of Burns, Or. W. W. Cardwell, the well known Roseburg attorney, imparts this interesting information. The prototype of Mutt is Tom Stevens, who was born at Looking Glass, and the creation of Jeff was inspired by the appearance of "Scotty" Ferguson, the companion of Stevens.

Stevens, who now lives at Burns, is about 6 feet 4 inches tall and very lanky. Ferguson died at Emeryville, Cal., about a year ago. He was a scotchman, not over five feet high, with a bull dog face, as Cardwell describes him, and with whiskers just as they are pictured in Jeff cartoons. Stevens is a professional gambler, and many of the old timers around here pronounce him the smoothest poker player that ever sat at a card table in these parts. About 20 years ago he was sent to the state penitentiary for short term for larceny. The rest of the story is told by Attorney Cardwell thus:

"After Stevens was released from the penitentiary he drifted out to Burns and fell in with Ferguson, who was conducting a livery stable which he established with savings of \$3000 or \$10,000 from wages earned in the employ of old Pete French, a heavy land owner in that locality in those days. Stevens and Ferguson became fast friends and ultimately business partners—that is, Stevens furnished the ideas and Ferguson the money. One day they decided to go to Emeryville, Cal., where the race horse game was then in the heyday of its existence. They invested in several good nags and for a time fortune smiled on them. But the inevitable happened. Their horses began to come under the wire too late and their money gradually left them. It was during this period of reverse that the idea of the characters of Mutt and Jeff was born in the mind of 'Bud' Fisher, the Examiner cartoonist. When a Stevens-Ferguson horse lost a race, the two men would immediately turn on each

## DENVER MAN LAUDS HIGH GRADE CAMP

Albert Wagner Inquest Gates District, And Gives It His O. K.

(High Grade News)

Mr. Albert Wagner, one of the leading mining men of the country has been in the district for about a month. He departed for Denver Thursday morning, very enthusiastic in his expressed opinion as to the demonstrated merits of Camp High Grade.

Mr. Wagner was requested by a representative of this paper to give his views on the district generally. In response he said:

"I am leaving for Denver tomorrow, after a stay, looking over the camp for the last four to five weeks. I have become so much interested in my investigation that I have delayed returning to Denver for over three weeks.

"I find conditions here that in my judgment opinions will change. The prospecting has been much neglected. Actual prospecting a little more, now, and less "Hot Air" will, I believe accomplish great results.

The "Wise One" sits around the hotels or bars telling people all they know; which is not much; but a detriment to the welfare of the mining interests.

I am convinced that from now on there will be a decided change in the caliber of the investigators that will come into the district. They will go over the camp thoroughly, and budge for themselves, and not be turned away by the knocks of the "Wise Ones."

"I shall return to High Grade very shortly, I am not leaving because of any disgust with the district. I am leaving because I ought to have been at home at least three weeks ago. I would like to go into details for the benefit of the people who may feel interested in this mining country. They will hear from me later when I am rested up."
