Modoc county votes on a \$60,000 bond issue for a new Court House on primary days. The bonds are of \$5,000 each and mature one each year for twelve years. This, with the money already raised will give a \$75,000 Court House of stone, cement and steel throughout.

County Judge B. Daly will this week send out workmen to repair the old crossing on the Cap Barnes slough on the West Side road. The present bridge will probably be replaced by grading in on two large steel culverts. This is a commendable move as the large delegation in attendance at the Development League meeting will visit the West Side by way of that road.

Improvements to the North Bank Road, the Oregon Electric Railway, the Hill lines in Oregon and Washington is shown in the report of the expenditures of the company for the fiscal year ending June 30 for extensions and betterments. During the last twelve months this amount has reached the enormous figures of \$2,000,000, and since January 1 more than \$4,000,000 has been expended.

School Supt's. Report

Following is a synopsis of the Annual Report of the County School Superintendent: Census enrollment Nov. 1911, 1243. Enrolled in the schools during the year, 754. Average daily attendance, 697. No. of eighth grade diplomas issued during the year, 33. No. teachers employed during the year, 44. School funds apportioned during year, \$217,76.29. Paid for teacher's wages during year, \$20,303.24. Paid for Library Books, \$128.08. No. School districts in the county, 20. No. school houses in the county, 26. No. school rooms in operation in the year, 36.

School boards not having yet engaged teachers can receive material assistance by notifying the County Superintendent as to the length of term, the wages they will pay and the price of board in the district where teachers are wanted. Letters of inquiry concerning these matters are received almost every day. Needed supplies should be asked for and if not on hand will be forwarded as soon as they can be received. These things should not be put off until time for school to open.
