## LEAGUE FAVORS STATE CONTROL

Does Not Want Any National Combine to Handle Resources

The trip to the West Side yesterday interfered somewhat with the exercise of the Development League, although sufficient time was had to swipe State Engineer Lewis' proposition regarding water power and irrigation off the map. The sentiment of the League seems to be in favor of State control of our resources rather than to have the same under national control, and several of the delegates expressed themselves very forcibly in matter.

The evening exercises were again largely attended, and all of the speakers listened to with marked attention.

The principal speaker was Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of O. A. C. and his remarks will appear in an early issue of the Examiner. Col. A. F. Hofer, of Salem, also delivered a very able address, as did J. M. Fulton, of Reno.

turned over the 16x45 addition to the proprietors. This is constructed of brick and the interior effect is of the Mezzanine floor type, reached by a wide easy stair from the center of the store. A very pleasing feature is the light, an abundance of which is admitted through improved Prism glass windows with gravity center ventilators, the first of this class to be introduced into Lakeview. The space on the Mezzanine floor will be occupied by the men's footwear, heavy clothing and trunks and suit cases. The lower or main floor of the annex will be taken up by spacious and well lighted offices, with a fire proof vault, and a men's fitting room with lavatory and toilet. A room in which will be carried ladies' cloaks, suits skirts and other ready to wear garments, which will be added to their present stock, will also be added. There will be a cozy ladies rest corner fitted up with easy chairs, across the entire front. A steam heating and lighting plant in the basement is included in the many changes being made all of which will be completed within the next few weeks.

The addition to the First National Bank, which is 41x48 feet with full basement, is being constructed of brick. This will be two stories in height, the lower floor of which will house the Lakeview postoffice, while the upper floor will be fitted up for office rooms. A cement sidewalk will be laid across the building on the south side and around the front. This undertaking will cost approximately \$5,000 and will add a great improvement to that corner.

Between the north wall of the First National Bank and the Lane & McAuliffe saloon, Dr. Daly is having erected a 75x24 foot one story building, with full basement which will have a cement sidewalk across the front. When completed the building will cost upwards of \$2,000 and is being constructed for restaurant purposes. China Eli, who conducted the restaurant in the old building on the same site, is now in San Francisco purchasing furnishings and equipment for the purpose and will fit up a modern and first class cafe in every particular.

The N. C. O. Railway Company is now working on and have nearly completed a new \$15,000 depot at the foot of Center street. The building is constructed of stone and brick and when completed will be, without exception, the handsomest and most modernly designed depot in Southern Oregon or Northern California. The building that is being used for a depot at present and which will be used for a freight house, after the completion of the new one, was built since January 1, at a cost of no less than \$3000.

Another valuable addition that has been added to the town since January 1st is the Snider opera house that was built at an expense of \$5,000. This is a wooden building but is of modern design, with maple floor and equipped with a large stage and contains the conveniences of a play house, motion picture show and dance hall.

The Reno Brewing Company's warehouse in Walters addition, north of the depot is a building that represents the cost of at least \$1500.

T. F. Bernard, hardware man, has spent about \$500 on the addition of a brick front across his store on Water

street.

The following dwellings have been completed this year and the estimated cost given below is a fair one:

Sam Bailey on Park street, brick \$2000; H. O. Kuhl in the Watson addition, bungalow style, \$2000; Dan F. Brennan, in process of construction, bungalow in the Drenkle addition, \$2000; John Lewis on Slash street, \$1500; the Catholic rectory, brick that is being erected immediately North of the Catholic church, \$1000 and Frank Wilson on Slash street, \$1000.

The Sunset Lake Lumber Co., that established a lumber yard on Center street reports that they have sold a considerable amount of lumber since establishing a yard in Lakeview. At present they have about 300,000 feet of lumber on the yard, and inform us that they have contracts to fill for six dwelling houses and three barns to be erected soon.

The Lakeview Land and Lumber Company report that their sales of lumber since January 1, will nearly reach the \$10,000 mark, and that they now have about 350,000 feet of lumber on hand in Lakeview.

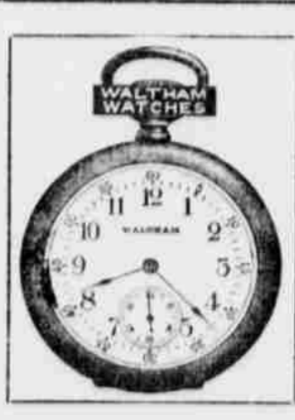
