It does not require great skill to stack, but, of course, experience is necessary to insure perfection in stacking grain. The method to be followed is in outline as follows: A tier of sneaves should be laid after the fashion followed in building a round shock. This tier should be as wide as the bottom of the stack and circular in form. The stacker then begins in the center of the stack to lay the next tier.
