HAY FINDS READY SALE IN 'FRISCO

With Reasonable Rate Product Could Be Shipped From Here At Profit

The following from the Nevada State Journal is of local interest owing to the large amounts of hay that will be left unfed the coming Winter in this section. The N.-C.-O. Railway officials have taken up the matter of getting a commodity rate on hay and in the event that reasonable rates can be established, it will no doubt prove a profitable business to ship Goose Lake Valley hay to the San Francisco market.

The big city farms are beginning to draw on the smaller towns for their supply, the movement from the country to the city warehouses increasing in volume daily. As the winter months approach, the demand is from the fields earlier than in a number of years past, the hay is in splendid condition and so far as the Nevada product is concerned finds ready sale at top prices. The following prices, being those quoted in San Francisco, are readily obtained by those who make offerings from this state in that market in car lots:

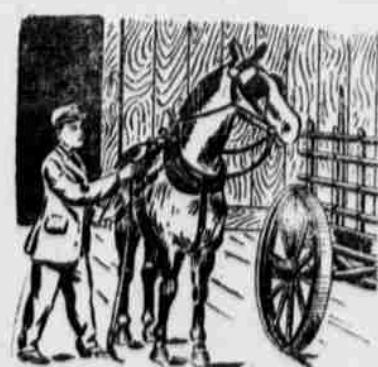
