SOME FEATURES OF THE EXPOSITION

Some interesting points about the Panama Pacific International Exposition:

The Court of Honor will be entirely surrounded by a colonnade comprised of massive arches. Groups of statuary symbolizing the rising and setting sun will surmount the colonnade.

The dominating theme of the Exposition will be the architectural viewpoint will be the huge tower of the Administration building, 42 feet high and flanked on either side by the gilded domes, towers and minarets of the remaining buildings of the group.

The largest building group in the Exposition will be the Palace of Agriculture, covering in two sections a floor area of 680,000 square feet.

Hundreds of thousands of trees, shrubs and vines are ready to be removed at the proper time and set out in accord with the plan that will harmonize with the architectural and color scheme of the buildings.

One of the most striking of the Exposition palaces will be the Horticultural Building, whose domes and minarets will rise to 100 to 125 feet. The building will be constructed of glass.

The concessions and amusement center will occupy 65 acres, the Manufacturers Building an area of 276,250 feet. The total area of the main exhibit palaces in square ground feet will be 3,731,500.

GAME INTERESTS TO BE IMPROVED

That the fish and game of Oregon are as well cared for as those of any of the states of the middle west and east, is the report brought by State Game Warden William L. Finley and C. K. Cranston, chairman of the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners, who returned last week from Denver, where they represented the State of Oregon at the annual session of the National Association of State Game Wardens and Commissioners and the American Fisheries Society.

"Oregon is doing as well as any of the other states in the matter of the propagation of fish," said Warden Finley after returning and with the co-operation of the farmers and sportsmen we will plant millions of fish each year, and will have this state as well stocked as any. In the matter of birds, the situation in Oregon is very encouraging, as many of the farmers have set aside certain portions of their farms for state refuges, and by the time the season is opened once more Oregon will have as many birds as she ever had. As much educational work has to be done each year in order to secure better game protection, it is essential that the commission have a museum of some kind. The Eastern cities are doing much in the way of museums, city parks and zoological gardens. The museum started by Colonel Hawking some years ago in the city hall and kept up by Mr. Wiegand, is too restricted as to room, and the state has lost many specimens of value on this account. The American Museum of Natural history took out of this state several years ago one of the largest and most perfect specimens of meteorites in the country. The time is getting short when we can get good groups of the animals that make their homes in this section of the country, and especially is this so with the mountain sheep, mule deer, antelope and elk. While eagles cannot be altogether done away with in a park, it is better

to have as much freedom offered the animals as possible. If a park has ponds and lakes it is no trouble to entice wild birds to come and live there."

"The state board of fish and game commissioners of Oregon is now devising plans to change the present fish and game laws in this state for the presentation to the next legislature. Our fish and game code is by far too complicated and too full of technicalities to be of much use. The board of commissioners wants to make the code shorter, more concise and clearer."

"As it is now," said Mr. Finley, "the board is not given the power that it should have in minor things regard-

ing the fish and game law. We are going to try to secure the passage of a law that will give the board more power. On my visit to Denver I took the matter up with representatives from other states and found out their methods. I, acting for the board, have come to the conclusion that we need a radical change in our fish and game code in this state.

"Among the others that the board is going to try and have passed is a law preventing game birds from being shot from the public highways. At present, people can drive into the country and shoot pheasants from an automobile or buggy. We want to change this."

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
