This being the first meeting of this kind held in Fort Rock a full attendance of teachers is desired and the patrons are invited to attend and participate in the work.

The subjects for chief consideration at this meeting are Arithmetic and Language. The Language work will embrace spelling, reading and grammar.

BODY BURIED IN ASHLAND CEMETERY

Frank Bauers Formerly Conducted Meat Business in Ashland

Ashland Record: The remains of Frank Bauers were interred in Hargrave cemetery last Friday. He died in Lakeview last April and was buried in the Odd Fellows cemetery there. For many years deceased was engaged in the meat business in Ashland. His widow and son, Frank, brought the remains from Lakeview and were met here by his daughter Mrs. Nellie Ragdon, and two children from Springfield.

An interesting item in connection with this is that the remains of Mrs. Bauers' father—C. H. Loftus—were buried in the grave at Lakeview from which the remains of Mr. Bauers were disinterred. The remains of Mr. Loftus had formerly reposed at Crane Lake but were brought to Lakeview the day of Mr. Bauers' disinterment and the exchange of occupants of the grave was made. Mrs. Bauers and son came with the remains to Ashland by way of Reno, Nevada and Sacramento, California.

That Crater Lake is the greatest scenic wonder in America was the decision of the party of noted scientists who have just visited Oregon. It is said that nothing other than just passing acquaintance ever existed between them. They would occasionally converse on general topics upon chance meetings but the girl had no idea of the young man's seriousness. Tuesday morning about nine o'clock Mr. Craddock called up the sheriff's office by telephone and asked for Miss McVey, and it is said asked her to come by the store at noon, as he wished to see her. She acquiesced to this and while on her way home at noon stepped into the store. Mr. Craddock was alone in the building and his first action was to question her in regard to a marriage engagement, of which he had been informed, existed between her and a man living in the East. She hastily acknowledged this to her questioner, and it is understood that the engagement has been quite generally known by her friends for some time. He then asked her to come back to the office, saying he wanted to talk to her. The girl states that after refusing to go to the office Craddock accosted her with abusive language, and she became frightened and started for the front door, through which she entered, and passed out crossing the street to the South. While she was crossing the street Craddock called to her from the side door, near the office, asking her to come back, but this she did not heed, and went directly home. This was almost exactly fifteen minutes past twelve o'clock and when Mr. Auten returned to the store at twenty minutes past twelve he found the unfortunate man in an office chair with a bullet wound in his head. And it is supposed from this that he immediately entered the office from the door, where he last called to the young lady, and committed the rash act.

Leo Craddock was a young man of about 30 years of age, and came to Lakeview last Spring to work for Mr. Auten. He had the appearance of a very quiet and pleasant young man, and one who was least expected of ever attempting to destroy his own life. His mother, Mrs. Martha M. Craddock, arrived yesterday evening from Klamath Falls. Besides his mother and sis-

ter, Mrs. Auten, deceased, he had three sisters and three brothers. He was a native of Jackson county, Oregon.

The testimony of the young lady at the coroner's inquest this morning was in accordance with the above statements.
