A BENEFICIAL TRIBUTE

In another column of this issue of the Examiner will be found an article of Professor Thomas Shaw's report on Central Oregon. Professor Shaw is agricultural expert for the Northern Pacific railroad, and his knowledge is sufficient to assure that he knows whereof he speaks. He says we have enough rich land in the central part of Oregon to produce more wheat than now is raised in the entire Inland Empire, and that this production may be realized by dry farming methods of cultivation. Professor Shaw is from the University of Wisconsin, where they turn out men who know things and do things especially in agriculture. Beyond that this man is the agricultural expert of a great railroad, and who without doubt has given more attention to agriculture from a scientific standpoint, and with better results than any other one man.

To double the wheat crop of Oregon is no mean consideration. Even to increase it 50 per cent by the use of land which has been regarded as of no value would be an achievement well worth the best efforts of those who give time and attention to the state development. If we are to trust Professor Shaw, and there is every evidence that we may, the area itself is one of the most valuable assets in the state. We may be sure to realize on it at some day or other; but the earlier the day the more rapid and satisfactory will be the growth of the state.

Professor Shaw's report will be of great weight; it has been given wide publicity in the large papers of the coast and some in the east, and will be of bountiful benefit toward heralding some of the great resources and possibilities of this particular section and the state of Oregon in general.

In an opinion given to State Treasurer Kay, Attorney General Crawford held that the new eight hour law passed at the last election by the people, included all work done by the state, county or city that might be contracted, but said it did not apply to regular employees of institutions or municipal departments where men are employed direct and by the month. But he held that it would apply to all work that might be contracted whether it was being done under contract or not.

Ducks Are Saleable

According to Section 2294 of the Game Laws of Oregon, it is lawful to offer wild ducks for sale between November 15 and December 15.

The section providing for the prohibition of the sale of ducks reads as follows: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation within the state of Oregon to sell or offer for sale, barter or exchange, or have in possession for the purpose of sale, barter or exchange any mallard ducks, wood ducks, widgeon, teal, spoonbill, gray, black, sprigtail or canvass back or any wild duck, between the fifteenth day of December of any year and the fifteenth day of November of the following year.

MINING COMPANY SHIPS GOOD ORE

Sunshine Property Produces Rock That Nets \$178.00 Per Ton

High Grade, Cal., Nov. 20. (Special Correspondence)—The Sunshine High Grade Mining Co. has received returns from a shipment of 168 sacks of Sunshine ore of a net weight of 13,233 pounds, that netted the company \$178. per ton. The average value per ton of this shipment would have been much higher were it not for the fact that the company saved 14 sacks of the richest ore for display purposes. This shipment again demonstrates that the ore from the Sunshine is exceptionally rich and that as soon as the company is able to install machinery and reach the large ore bodies beneath big profits will follow. The company has its ore on display at 2808 Mission street., San Francisco, where it is attracting a great deal of attention the room being crowded from early morning until 10 o'clock at night.

Good Year for Park

Klamath Northwestern: Superintendent J. Frank Arant of Crater Lake National Park arrived home Tuesday evening from Fort Klamath and the Park.

Mr. Arant left the Government headquarters in the park last week. He says there was considerable snow there then and that there must be nearly five feet there by this time. He says the Crater Lake tourist season, despite the fact that it has been a short one and the weather unfavorable, has been the best in the history of this park. Over 5,000 people visited the park during the year. This was more than 1,000 more than last year.

Will Make Appointments

President Taft has planned to fill all vacancies occurring before March 4 without regard to the change of administration.

There are several important appointive offices now vacant, including the commissionership of the bureau of Indian Affairs and the office of chief of the bureau of chemistry. The president intimated that Woodrow Wilson would probably find all positions filled when he goes into office.

Fort Rock district threshed 6,889 bushels of grain this season, a good showing for the first year: Lake had 2,831 and Silver Lake 10,141 bushels; total, 19,861 bushels. At the present market value would be something like \$20,000. For a country like that, until recently, it was supposed no grain would grow and mature looks very encouraging. A much larger acreage will be put in next year.

Last Saturday Deputy Sheriff P. D. Reeder placed an attachment on the stock and fixtures in the saloon of Jas. S. Wakefield, for \$700 in favor of Glenn Eyre, the assignee of Portland creditors. It appears that Wakefield gave M. R. Matthews, representing Lang & Co., a check for \$46 on the Bank of Lakeview, which was protested by Chas. Umbach. The creditors then assigned their accounts to Glenn Eyre who caused the goods to be attached. The closing of the saloon caused some local creditors to set up and take notice. It was soon discovered that Wakefield was badly involved, all of his property being heavily mortgaged. George Winkelman has \$500 on the stable and lot adjoining the saloon; Ben Van Dorn and Wm. Lane \$500, and Jas. Hayes \$500 on the saloon and lot; Douglas Linebaugh \$400 and Chas. Pitcher \$500 on his residence; besides there are a number of unsecured notes.

ANOTHER MINING CAMP ON RECORD

Work Is Being Done On Prospect North of Crane Creek

J. D. Todd, who has some mining claim interests in a new district recently opened in the Warner Range about one mile north of Crane Creek, was in Lakeview Saturday to place his property on record. Flint Vernon, Steve Down and other prominent farmers in the valley are interested with Mr. Todd. He reports that some prospects which have returned flattering assays have been encountered in the ledge on which work is now being done, and that the formation gives indications of permanency of the vein. He states that he is now working on a tunnel that has been driven something over one hundred feet.

The new prospects that have been uncovered in the Crane Creek vicinity gives evidence of the continuance of the gold seams that have been found in the High Grade District, and it is contended by mining men that the discovery of gold mines anywhere between the districts of High Grade and Windy Hollow is very probable.

Postal Deposits

Postmaster Hitchcock has announced that approximately \$28,000,000 has been deposited to date in postal savings banks by 290,000 individuals, averaging \$86 per depositor. The system is now operated in 12,773 postoffices, and 7367 banks have qualified to receive the postal savings funds.

Beginning at a point 840 feet South of the N.E. corner of Section 14, T. 39, S. R. 20 E. W.
