ASSIST IN LEGISLATION

Every business man in the country and many in foreign countries, are taking stock of the probabilities of democratic legislation.

Farmers and fruit growers are essentially business men, and the action of Congress is likely to affect them in a marked degree. They showed that they had a lively idea of the importance of national legislation at the time the Canadian reciprocity treaty was under discussion. Now the tariff issue has a much broader aspect.

Each farmer will, it is assumed, settle for himself the question whether he wants the tariff reduced, and if so, on what articles. It is time that he should make sure of his position on this matter, and having done so, communicate his ideas to his Congressman and Senator. Congress, it is to be presumed, is going to do as nearly as possible what the people want. If you think the election of a democratic administration means the cutting of the tariff on grain, fruits and vegetables, on cattle, pigs, wool, and all other things that are produced by the farmer, then write to your Congressman and say so. If you think otherwise, write and tell what you really want. Your representative in Congress will be better able to legislate for you if they know where you stand.

Inspection of the vote cast for Congressmen, which is the test of political parties according to the direct primary law, shows that the progressives failed to poll enough votes to obtain official standing as a party, and they are in the same fix they were last summer, despite the fact that Roosevelt polled more votes than were cast for Taft. The figures show that if Lafferty's entire vote be counted for the progressives that party lacks 5,000 of having enough.

Attorney-General Crawford has declared that it will be necessary for Circuit Judges who sentenced the five murderers now at the Oregon penitentiary to again fix the date of execution, as the original dates had gone by because of reprieves. Should it be found necessary to have the Judges set a new date for the hangings, it is expected that the wholesale hanging schedule for December 13 would be avoided, as different dates would probably be fixed by the several Judges.

Candidates for Oregon's governorship at the 1914 election are taking time by the forelock. Besides W. S. U'Ren, father of the single tax measure at the last election having declared himself as an aspirant to such office, Mayor Grant B. Demick of Oregon City is also a candidate for the republican nomination for Governor of the state of Oregon. Both men are republicans but stand far apart in points of belief.

A dispatch from Constantinople under date of December 3, states that it is officially announced that an armistice has been signed between Turkey and Bulgaria, Servia and Montenegro, Greece being the only state refusing to sign the protocol. It is to be hoped that thus ends one of the shortest and most bloody wars in the history of the world.
