The Lakeview Herald has passed into the control of O. C. Stidger, and in the last issue he announces that thereafter the Herald will be identified with the Democratic party. Mr. Stidger is an old printer and newspaper man, and there is no reason why he should not make a success of his undertaking. With an incoming Democratic administration, the outlook is certainly encouraging.

The announcement of President-elect Wilson to call an extra session of Congress in April meets with the approval of every one. If the policy of the new administration is to result in good to the country it cannot come too soon. On the other hand the uncertainty of the acts of the Democratic Congress will tend to "make things tight," and therefore the sooner the policy is known the better it will be for the country. The Examiner is not of a pessimistic nature, and while it does not approve of drastic changes in our system of government, yet at the same time it believes that in taking prompt action Mr. Wilson has acted wisely.

Now if the Curtis Publishing Company will follow the example of Colliers and replace the editor of the Saturday Evening Post with a man of broader views it will have performed an excellent service for its readers. According to views of Editor Lorimer, all things are awry, with the possible exception of the present postal rates. Taxes are too high, industries are making too much money, the calling of Congress in special session is unwise, in all everything is going to the damnation bow wows. It is really too bad that the editor of the Post should be of such a pessimistic nature.

Tomorrow, Friday the thirteenth, will be hangman's day in the Penitentiary at Salem. Five men are to be executed at that time for the killing of their fellow men. While it causes a thrill of horror, yet at the same time no doubt justice will be meted out to the condemned men. It recalls the cruel killing of the Newell boys here in Lake county in 1910, for which crime Ike Harold paid the death penalty. All familiar with that terrible crime felt that hanging was none too severe for the perpetrator of such a deed, and those who are to suffer death tomorrow are as guilty as he.

It is quite likely that the coming year will witness the completion of the big irrigation system instituted by the Oregon Valley Land Co. While this may have an uncertain sound to some people, yet at the same time it is a positive fact that the Drews dam will be completed early in March at the latest, while nearly enough lumber has been cut for the completion of the flume in the canyon. When that part of the work is completed water can be turned in the canal and many thousands of acres will be covered by the section when in use.

It is indeed pleasing to hear that the N. O. O. Railway Company is to colonize a large acreage here in Goose Lake Valley. The Hunter lands are probably the choicest of the raw lands in the valley, and with proper development will no doubt produce much wealth. Generally speaking the lands are comparatively level with deep rich soil, although at present they are covered with a growth of sagebrush, having been used for grazing purposes for the past several years. If the plans of the railway company materialize, this section of the County should witness a rapid growth in the next few years. The lands are easily cleared, and with a sufficient amount of water for irrigation purposes there is no doubt as to the results to be obtained by intelligent cultivation.

Paisley Pick-ups

Geo. M. Bailey, President of the Northwest Townsite Co., arrived in Paisley Wednesday. He was accompanied by Mr. Anderson, one of the Company agents at Portland and Mr. Erickson.

Work has been started on the Gaylord mines and will be continued all winter according to the present plans of those in charge of the properties. A better prospect than these mines would be difficult to find in Oregon and their development has been retarded only because there are no shipping facilities near. Large bodies of ore have been uncovered, some assaying as high as \$206.00 per ton, and it is certain that a large body of low grade ore is in sight. Many claims were staked in this district last spring and it is likely that many new ones will be located next year.

Nelson as his post office address, did on November 29, 1912, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your Homestead Entry No. 63223, Serial No. 63223, made March 28, 1910, for SE 1/4 Section 1, Township 26 South, Range 14 East Willamette Meridian, an as grounds for his contest he alleges that you have wholly abandoned said land since date of entry; that you never cultivated or improved said land in any manner.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confessed by you, and your said entry will be cancelled thereunder without your further right to be heard thereon, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below your answer, under oath, specifically meeting and responding to these allegations of contest, or if you fail within that time to file in this office due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail. If this service is made by the delivery of a copy of your answer to the contestant in person, proof of such service must be either the said contestant's written acknowledgment of his receipt of the copy, showing the date of its receipt, or the affidavit of the person by whom the delivery was made stating when and where the copy was delivered; if made by registered mail, proof of such service must consist of the affidavit of the person by whom the copy was mailed stating when and the post office to which it was mailed, and this affidavit must be accompanied by the postmaster's receipt for the letter.
