Paisley Pick-ups

(Chewaucan Press)

The Paisley Library Association met and organized Friday evening at the Harper Hall. About sixteen members were present. Officers were elected and several committees were appointed. Those who will control the destinies for the ensuing term are Miss Amelia Henry, President; R. N. Buchwalter, Vice President; David Harrower, Secretary-Treasurer. Books from the State Library have arrived and will soon be placed in the reading room.

Three sales were made last week by the Northwest Townsite Co., in the Paisley Irrigation Project. Forty acres went to Geo. W. Hayne of Juneau, Alaska, forty acres to Victor Peterson, of Fergus Falls, Minn., and one hundred and twenty acres to Peter Erickson of Dover, Idaho.

S. A. Mushen is in Paisley at the present time and is making a survey of the Chewaucan marsh for the owners of land in that section.

State Engineer Lewis will be in Paisley on the 21st of this month and at that time some attempt will be made to apportion the waters of the Chewaucan river so that each land owner in the valley will know just what amount of water he is entitled to. Mr. Mushen's survey is being made to determine just what amount of land each individual holds under the various ditches, and his plats will be used by the land owners when the matter comes up for adjudication.

Thos. Hawthorn who surveyed the entire Chewaucan watershed, for the state the past summer, covered the same territory.

There were some water claimants from Crooked Creek and a few from Willow Creek. As many claimants were not prepared to offer complete testimony to their rights and use of the water another meeting is called for the first Monday in June at which time the full and complete testimony will be taken of all persons claiming any of the water of the Chewaucan or tributaries. Thereafter the records will be subject to public inspection. Mrs. Batchelder kept a record of the testimony offered. Mr. Chinnock is an affable person and thoroughly in touch with the interests of this part of the state. He has made many friends here and we hope for frequent visits in the future. He will hold another meeting at Paisley Saturday.
