STATE HIGHWAYS TO LINK CAPITALS

While Senator Burne and his joint committee are going again into the whole question of national aid to good roads, Congressman Warturton of Washington has his bill for the con-struction of a national military high-way nearly ready for introduction in the house. This military highway plan, which proved effective in War-burton's campaign, call for the build-ing of paved roads connecting the capi-tals of all of the states with each other and with the national capital—a mat-ter of 15,000 miles of highway paved six-teen feet wide. The money to pay for this improvement he would secure by restoring the internal revenue tax of 1876 on tobacco tax, he says, is about \$58,000,000, while under the tax in force in 1879 it would now be \$138,000,000.

STATE LINE TOWN GIVEN OPINION

Representing that Main street of the town of New Pine Creek is the divid-ing line between Oregon and California, Bert Wade has written the Attorney-General asking whether a councilman residing in California but conducting business on the Oregon side, is legally elected. Also asks that in incorporat-ing the place one of the signers to the petition calling the election was a resi-dent of California, and he further de-claims the saloons on the Oregon side are operated all night, and he desires to know if this is legal. Replying, the Attorney-General has advised him that, as New Pine Creek is incorporated under the laws of Ore-gon, the town limits end at the Califor-nia line, and that the election of a Cal-ifornian as councilman is illegal. Fur-ther advised him with regard to the signing of the petition by a California resident, he says the election is not in-valid because of this, unless the exclu-sion of the name would not leave on the petition the number of names required by law. The saloons come under the Oregon laws, he says, and are subject to prosecution if violating the state laws.—Telegram.

Odds and Ends

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, author of "Sherlock Holmes," and well known Irish peer, is advocating a tunnel from England to France. He believes that such a venture would be entirely suc-cessful and would be a great national asset to Great Britain.

A college for hoboes is to be one of America's new educational institutions if the plans of James Eads How, the "millionaire tramp," are carried out. St. Louis is suggested as the location of such a college owing to its central location.

San Francisco is to have a handsome and picturesque new railway station erected during 1913 on the present site of the Coast line station at Third and Townsend streets. It will cost \$500,000, and will be in the mission style of architecture.

Congressman Fitzgerald of the U. S. House of Representatives and chair-man of the appropriations committee, states that the first ship to sail through the Panama canal will do so September 25, 1913, on the four hundredth anni-versary of the discovery of the Pacific ocean by Balboa.

Sprinter Ralph Craig May Quit Athletics.

It is said on good authority that Ralph Craig, winner of the 100 and 200 meter events at the Olympic games in Sweden, will quit athletics this 22d. He is employed by a Detroit firm and wishes to devote all his time to busi-ness. Craig is one of the greatest sprinters ever developed. While a stu-dent at Michigan university he cap-tured the intercollegiate 100 and 200 yard titles.

Kramer After World's Championship. Frank Kramer, for eleven years the champion bicycle rider of America, will this season attempt to win the world's championship. The world's cham-pionship races will be held at Valisburg track, Newark, N. J., on Aug. 24, 27 and 30. Kramer hopes to win the na-tional title for the twelfth time this year. It will be decided in a manner entirely different from that of the past. When the championship races are run there can be but two contenders. This is due to the fact that the National Cycling association is running both the eastern and western races this year. Heretofore the championship races have been run in the east, and at the end of the season Kramer has always been the winner of the largest number of points. Two men are after his hon-ors—Jackie Clarke and Alfred Goulet, who have been battling at Salt Lake City.

Bedient of the Red Sox.

Hugh Bedient of the Boston Ameri-cans is "some" pitcher. A couple of years ago at Corey, Pa., he hung up a record of forty-two strikeouts in twen-ty-four innings. That feat attracted worldwide attention, and a Boston scout grabbed him. He was "farmed" with the Providence team. He won eight and lost eleven games while with them. The Red Sox then gave the Providence club five players in exchange for Bedient—Purtell, McHale, Killaly, Lonigan and Janvria. Boston thinks Bedient worth more than the five men traded. He has defeated the Athletics five times.

Offers \$3,000 For Player.

George Van Hatten, who, besides being an umpire in the Northwestern league, is a scout for the Pittsburgh National club, has, it is said, offered Judge W. M. McCredie \$3,000 for Ed-die Mensor, the great little outfielder of the Portland Colts. Judge McCredie has taken the case under advisement. However, it is hardly likely that Mensor will go to the Pirates until the Cleveland club, with which McCredie is doing business, has passed on him.

Patterson Wins Geelong Cup.

A Melbourne (Victoria) boy, Gerald Patterson, has won the Geelong cup, which has been in competition for thir-teen years. The conditions are that as a handicap prize it must be won for three years, and the winner each year must concede fifteen handicap more each year. It so becomes a test of improvement and has been the cov-eted trophy for many years, having been won by many famous champions for a year or two, but never three times until Patterson's triumph.

Price of Ball Players Goes Up.
