## A BIG MAN

For the personality and the character of Ex-president William Howard Taft, the American Nation will always be bound to entertain high respect. In the main, both among political friends and political opponents, that is the manifest sentiment that goes along with the handshakings and farewells.

Whatever of good or bad there is in that period for which the former president is held responsible is all in the crucible of history. The pleasing and felicitous feature of it all is the personality of the man who has just turned over the reins of government to another, and about that there is but one general opinion—esteem.

As a clean, high-minded, amiable American gentleman and statesman who has given years of varied and valuable service to his country, William Howard Taft stands high among the men of his time.

Although no longer a public man in the political sense, Mr. Taft's days of useful service are presumably many. That certainly is the hope and the best wish of his countrymen without regard to party. And now that he has stepped from the official pinnacle back into private life, he may be assured of the heartiest of American sentiments. He is a big man.

The appointment by President Wilson of Franklin K. Lane of California, to the office of secretary of the interior, is taken with much favor in general throughout the west. Mr. Lane is a western man and understands the big problems that are to be solved in his home land. No doubt the west will obtain beneficial results from his efforts.

## Depot Site Unsettled

V. L. Snelling, the sage of Fairport, spent several days in Lakeview during the week. He states that as yet the N.-C.-O. people have made no move toward re-establishing the New Pine Creek depot. In fact, the situation appears to be somewhat complicated to an uninterested party.

It appears that the people desiring the depot re-established are residents of Oregon while the depot site is in California. The question is whether the people of Oregon have anything to do with depot facilities in California?

It would therefore seem to be a matter for the Interstate Commerce Commission to settle rather than for either of the State Commissions. To locate a new depot site on the Oregon side would perhaps afford no greater accommodation to the people interested than does the present Fairport depot.

## New Mail Route

Frank Whitney, postoffice inspector, Tuesday morning left for Valley Falls and the northern part of the county on official business. A part of his duties will be investigating and reporting upon the proposed new mail route between Valley Falls and Butte, a postoffice on the Bend-Burns route. It is understood that there is quite a large settlement along the proposed route, and that at least two new postoffices will be established. The distance between Butte and Valley Falls is about 70 miles, and the new route will run along the eastern boundary of Lake County. It is understood that one of the new offices applied for will be located some 15 miles due east of Christmas Lake and will be called Buffalo. The other will probably be in the vicinity of Alkali valley.

## NOTICE TO THE FRUIT GROWERS OF LAKE COUNTY

You are requested to begin spraying your fruit trees at once. You can use stronger spray with better results while the trees are dormant. I give the formula as recommended by the State Board of Horticulture.

Quick lime 50 lbs., sulphur 50 lbs., water 150 gallons. Slack lime thoroughly, add the sulphur and boil one hour add water to make 150 gallons. Use this strength only on dormant trees.

## NOTICE OF CONTEST

Department of the Interior United States Land Office, Lakeview, Oregon, March 12, 1913.

To Cleo, Leo, Blanche, Ray and Edward Drake, heirs of M. A. Drake, of 528, Belmont St., Salem, Oregon, Contestors:

You are hereby notified that Lewis E. Penrose, who gives Fort Rock, Oregon as his post-office address, did on February 12, 1913, file in this office his only corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your Homestead, Entry, Serial No. 01821, made April 21, 1909, for Lots 1, 2, 3, Section 5, Township 26 South, Range 14 East, Willamette Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that you have wholly abandoned said entry since the date of the death of the entryman and have failed to cultivate or improve said land since date of entryman's death on October 20, 1910 that entryman during his lifetime did not establish actual bona fide residence on said land.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confessed by you, and your said entry will be canceled thereunder without your further right to be heard therein, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the fourth publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically meeting and responding to these allegations of contest, or if you fail within that time to file in this office due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail. If this service is made by the delivery of a copy of your answer to the contestant in person, proof of such service must be either the said contestant's written acknowledgment of his receipt of the copy, showing the date of its receipt, or the affidavit of the person by whom the delivery was made stating when and where the copy was delivered; if made by registered mail, proof of such service must consist of the affidavit of the person by whom the copy was mailed stating when and the postoffice to which it was mailed, and this affidavit must be accompanied by the postmaster's receipt for the letter.

You should state in your answer the name of the postoffice to which you desire future notices to be sent to you.
