## WESTERN HEMLOCK A NEW AGENCY VALUABLE TIMBER

Has 88 per cent Strength of the Famous Douglas Fir

Western hemlock, save the Department of Agriculture, deserves a better opinion and more general use than it now obtains. Intrinsically it is among the most important of western woods.

The wood of western hemlock has generally been considered an inferior one chiefly because of the prejudice created by the name, which has caused it to be identified with eastern bemlock. Tests by the Forest Service, however, show it to have 88 per cent the strength of Douglas fir, one of the country's chief construction timters. In fact it is often mixed with Douglas fir and used for the same purposes.

The wood is practically free from pitch, has a bandsome grain, takes paint and stain well, and works smoothly. It is suitable for sash and door stock, furniture, interior finish, framing, flooring, boxes, barrels and pulp. In bridges and trestles it can be used for all but the heaviest construction. When properly treated with preservatives, it is a valuable cross-tie and pole

According to Forest Service Bulletin 115, the best stands of western hemlock are found in the coast region and through the Cascade Mountains. The bulletin further gives the results of tests by which the mechanical properties of western hemiock have been determined, and tells of the different uses to which the wood is adapted.

The Public Library as an A to Civic Betterment.

#### NUCLEUS OF TOWN WELFAR

It Can Be Used as a Social Center at Made to Extend Its Activities In Co operation With Other Municipal D

A city plan exhibition now occupie everal large rooms in the Free Publ Library building of Newark, N. J. Ti rooms were made rendy, the article classified and hung and about 200 bels printed on a hand press by assis auts in the fibrary. This exhibition contains no pictures or drawings civic centers, plazas, parks, wat fronts or other beauty spots for New ark or any other city. The city pla commission, which supplied most the material, confined itself to the study of such homely facts as may belp them to reach wise answers to the question, "How shall we make Newark a more efficient city?"

Several departments of the city goveroment at the library's suggestion have contributed to the exhibit and sent material to illustrate their own work and to show how closely their several activities are allied to the plan of making a more efficient city.

If a public library may extend its activities beyond the field of book pur chase, book storing and book distribution, then it becomes at once an institution particularly well fitted to co-operate with any or all of the depart ments of its city.

In the last ten years the modern American free public library has proved, not in one city only, but in a score and not in one town only, but in hundreds, a much more valuable institution than even those responsible for its development anticipated. The general public almost always thinks of its library in terms of literature and rarely in terms of commerce tiveness in the academic field, will take over to itself, either directly or through efficient co-operation, much of the work now done by municipal libraries and by special libraries like OFFICE-Daly Building. those of banks, factories, insurance companies, charity organization societies, municipal research bureaus, etc. Useful as public libraries now are they have scarcely begun to occupy the vast utilitarian field which awalts them.
