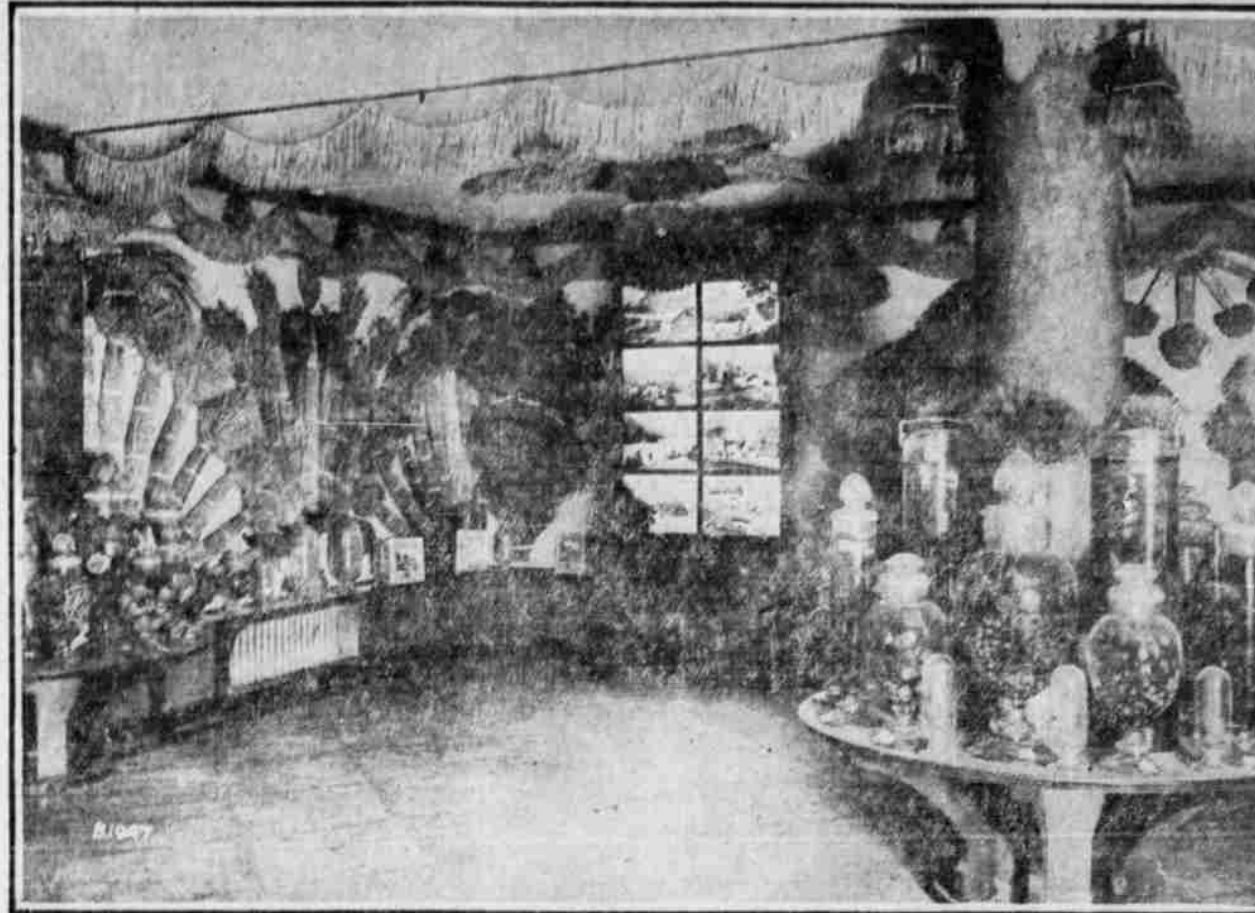
A decree forever dissolving the bonds of matrimony now existing between you and this plaintiff, and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements herein incurred.

Oregon will no doubt derive great and lasting benefits from the permanent display of grains and grasses in the exhibition room of the Northwest Development League in St. Paul. Splendid samples of wheat, oats, flax, rye and barley were part of the state's magnificent agricultural exhibit at the recent Minneapolis and Chicago land shows and were brought East for display purposes by the Great Northern Railway. Commercial organizations, the railroads and the Development League are carrying on an extensive publicity campaign to attract the attention of visitors in the Twin City to the display of the products of the soil of the American Northwest and it is likely thousands of people will view the exhibit annually.

WILL OPEN SNAKE RIVER TO BOATS

The construction of a dam in the Snake river at Dry Gulch, six miles below Lewiston, the dam to provide locks that would afford the convenient passage of large steamers and to provide as well electric power for at least 25,000 horse power, is a logical development of river improvement work, in the opinion held by Captain S. J. Winslow, of the U. S. dredge boat Willows.

This opinion as expressed by the captain in commenting on the fact that as the government has now made adequate appropriation for the completion of Cello canal, which will afford direct connection between the lower Columbia and the upper Columbia and Snake, definite plans will now receive attention for the permanent improvement of the upper river channels to accommodate the traffic made possible by the opening of the canal.

"The matter of the construction of a dam at Dry Gulch," said Captain Winslow, "is one that should receive the encouragement of the Lewiston and Clarkston people." The fall between the Lewiston water front and Dry Gulch is about twenty-one feet. A fine dam site is available there where locks could be conveniently installed. A dam such as I refer to would give the rivers at Lewiston a normal depth of eight feet above the normal low water of the present. The dam would totally obliterate three rapids, and would make the rivers at Lewiston and for great distances both up and down
