EXPOSITION WORK IS PROGRESSING

New Structures Rising and Many Contracts Have Been Let

Physical work upon the Panama-Pacific International Exposition is progressing rapidly. A vast army of workmen is now transforming the grounds, which extend from the foot of Van Ness Avenue to the limits of the Golden Gate, a distance of 15,000 feet. Work on the Palace of Machinery is underway. The arched trusses are going up rapidly and before long that important part of the immense structure will be completed.

Work on the high water system is about to be inaugurated. Material for this system has been ordered, and some sixteen inch pipe is now on the ground ready to be installed. The work on the sanitary storm sewers for state and foreign sites progressing rapidly. Contractors are grading the Exposition site and are using 312 head of stock and equipment.

Files for the construction of the Ferry Freight slip are being driven and the steel for the steel apron for the ferry freight slip is now being prepared.

Work on the construction of the Palace of Education has started and the grading of the site for the Automobile Building, is now under way and is nearly completed. The sewer in the main roadway of the Concessions section has been completed.

The grading of the site for the Liberal Arts Building, Court of Honor, North entrance to Court of Honor, and Fulton Basin is now under way.

The pile foundation of the Transportation Building is now being installed.

The contract for the construction of the Food Products Building will be awarded within a few days by the Buildings and Grounds Committee. The contract for plumbing for the Food Products Building has been awarded. Plans and specifications for the Agriculture Building have been completed and bids received.

WEST IS ANXIOUS ABOUT FREE TRADE

Portland Telegram: When the Chamber of Commerce sent a protest against removing all protection from wool, lumber, fruit, wheat products, wheat, hides, livestock products and other things furnished by the Northwest for the world markets, it emphasized the sense of isolation which business men here feel when any tariff reform is taken up. They have become convinced that tariffs do not apply to the West. When revisions are discussed, it means to cut away any suspicion of protection that the West may have received. Tariffs are for the communities having many votes in Congress, and free raw materials and free trade are meant where communities are sparsely settled and are laboring to build up industries.

Since the free list of the proposed tariff measure has been published, the Western business men become more than ever convinced that they must fight the world in the industrial field on a free-trade basis when selling their products, but must buy their supplies, machinery and necessities from the highly-protected areas of the country. Realizing that this is a severe handicap for the Northwest, and that such conditions will make it necessary to double the fostering influence of business, local men are inclined to hope the ordeal will soon be over, and the situation may be made definite and certain.

Wool men on the range continue to feel deep apprehension. Oregon range has deteriorated rapidly in the last few years, owing to excessive feeding. Grave doubt is felt that the Oregon range herd will be able to compete with the sheep of Australia, where the range is vastly cheaper and in much better condition. But with a good price for mutton here, and lower freight rates to the manufacturing centers of the country, the Oregon wool-grower is willing to try to compete. Australia has cheap herdsmen, cheap railway transportation to tide-water under Government aid and control, and low tonnage rates on cheap English-tub steamships to the United States markets. The Eastern Oregon grower has to pay high priced herdsmen, finds land rising rapidly in value, pays more than the Australian for the railway haul across the continent, must ship in high-priced American bottoms if he takes the water route, and faces other handicaps which make him think that growing wool is not a dream of pleasure.

Northwestern livestock interests view an open market for their products with some concern. Australia has just landed a shipload of meat at San Francisco, and offers to send much more. This meat is produced on an open, practically free range, in a genial climate that requires no housing or winter feeding. Australia is now selling refrigerator meats all along the Oriental coast, and is determined to make an inroad into the Coast states, if all bars are thrown down.

Lumber manufacturers have the least concern, although they would appreciate a little duty to balance wage conditions. If they have to enter the Atlantic Coast markets in competition with British Columbia, with the British Columbia mill enjoying the privilege of shipping on cheap foreign bottoms and the Oregon mill being restricted to the high-priced, scant American craft, and with the American

Reboot paying the same Canal tolls as all others, the lumber sees where he will be discriminated against. He would enjoy a tariff to this extent.

Whatever the various producers feel about the situation, they see no help. They have two Democrats in the Senate, who are expected to vote to take duties off other western products. Eastern men will insist upon protecting their own districts. The local sentiment is that a free-for-all fight will have to be made in the near future to maintain the industries already established here.

MILLINERY TRUST DESTROYING BIRDS

The destruction of great numbers of native birds which are the natural enemies of insects has at last aroused the law makers. The fight is now being waged in Congress by bird lovers, scientists and farmers on the one hand and the millinery interests of New York, Boston and Philadelphia on the other hand.

The point at issue is the passage of a provision in the Tariff Act which prohibits the importation of "aigrettes" and the plumage of other wild birds into this country, except ostrich plumes and the feathers of domestic fowls. The Ways and Means Committee has reported favorably on this section of the Tariff Act, but the wholesale milliners have combined and are using every effort to defeat it.

The trade in plumage of native birds is illegal in some states, but not in others. As long as the Government permits the importation of goods which are contraband in certain states, it is practically impossible to prevent the use and sale in other states.

"If our school children, teachers and bird lovers will write immediately to their senators and congressmen asking for their assistance in the passage of this measure, we can at one stroke accomplish one of the greatest steps in wild bird protection that has ever been taken. We can save untold numbers of our song, insectivorous, and plume birds from one end of the nation to the other," said Mr. Gilbert Pearson, Secretary of the National Association of Audubon Societies.

"The demand for plumage of wild birds for millinery purposes during the past twenty-five years has grown to enormous proportions. In an effort to supply the markets, our woods, fields and sea coasts have been combed systematically by plume hunters to get bird wings and breasts to use in the millinery trade. Many varieties of birds are in the best plumage during the breeding season and they are killed at this time and the young are left in the nest to die of starvation."

"The investigations of the Biological Survey of the Department of Agriculture shows that the greater number of our wild birds are of benefit in protecting crops," continued Mr. Pearson.

"This fight is clear-cut and we believe the farmers, fruit growers and others throughout the country will raise their voices against the millinery trust which seeks to depopulate the bird world."
