CREAMERY A CERTAINTY

Mr. Bunting now has the contract blank and any farmers desiring to sign for more cows can do so by seeing him. The price contracted by Mr. Troest to pay farmers for their butterfat is based at two cents below the San Francisco market.

The farmers who have signed up cows thus far, and the number are as follows:

J. M. Currey, 10; S. F. Vernon, 10; R. K. Funk, 7; Joseph O'Brien, 9; J. E. Norin, 6; Ed. Hartzog, 8; S. A. Down, 4; Andrew Keister, 8; D. J. Wilcox, 5; Smith & Bunting, 20; Chas. Eccleston, 5; P. M. Cory, 10; Andy Morris, 25; J. C. Oliver, 20; C. W. Reed, 30; Tracy Bros., 20. Cream will be received twice a week in the Summer time and once a week in the Winter.

Farmers are to provide their own separators and at least for a while will deliver their product to the creamery, but after a time it is probable that a delivery wagon will be operated in conjunction with the business.

Mr. Troest left yesterday morning for San Francisco where he will purchase his machinery, and he is of the opinion that he will be ready to receive the first lot of cream about July 1st. It is possible that he will buy a car load of dairy cows on this trip, which if he does will likely delay him about a week, but otherwise he will return in a few days and will immediately begin work on his building.

Mr. Troest comes to us with the best of recommendations both to his ability as a creamery man as well as his honesty and integrity in business transactions. W. H. Shirk, of the First National Bank, has received a letter from a reputable business firm, with whom Mr. Troest has had dealings, highly recommending him as a business man and a citizen. PRESIDENT FIRM FOR FREE TRADE

The President was told at the conference that the present bill does discriminate against the West and that that section of the country would surely suffer unless the bill was amended. The Senators laid greatest stress on

the political effect of passing the Underwood bill as it stands and told the President frankly that if Western Democrats were compelled to vote for the bill that carries free wool, free sugar and free lumber. Republicans would certainly succeed several Western Democratic Senators and a loss of four Democratic Senators will give control of the Senate to the Repub-

licans.
The President said plainly he did not agree with the view expressed by the Senators that free wool, sugar, lumber, etc., would hurt Western industries. He held it would rather stimulate trade. As for the political effect of the Underwood bill, he said that if these Senators would vote for the bill as it is endorsed by the Administration they would strengthen rather than weaken themselves at home, and he believed the passage of the Underwood bill would increase the Democratic membership of the next Senate.
So firm was the President in voicing his view that his callers abandoned all hope of removing wool, sugar or lumber from the free list. They privately concede that the Administration programme will go through.
