How Prisoners Are Makin Highways In Colorado.

IS CHEAP AND PERMANEN?

Made Possible by the Low Cost of ti Work - Benefit to Taxpayers as Workers-Honor System Used Ex clusively and Is Very Successful.

The question of good roads is one the most vital with which the farmin community of any state has to des Many communities in the differen states long ago realized the vast in portance of this question and have to en advantage of the opportunity at has to build permanent roadways, says J. Tynan, warden of the Colorae state penitentiary. No one will dispu the fact that good roads are our great est need and our greatest asset.

A serious question presenting itse to the people is the fact that certain interests of the nation are seeking destroy the good roads movement. for one, do not believe that the peop will passively consent to be held in th clutches of the foes of the public welhere in Colorado, where we have demonstrated that good roads can be constructed more economically and more expeditiously by convict labor, under the guiding hand of the state, than under any other conditions.

The criminal, as we all know, is a costly unit to society. It is only during the period of his imprisonment that society has an opportunity to control his purposes to such useful ends as will materially lessen the cost of his imprisonment and often make it a source of remuneration rather than an expense to the state. Under most of our prison systems the convicts come out more cruel and cunning than when they went in.

Our prisons do not reform the prisoner, and our prison factory labor does not teach the prisoner a trade, not-

withstanding the claims made to this effect. For the most part the prisoners are employed on piecework, and there is no chance for an individual to master all the details of any trade. Fiftyfive per cent of the prison boards where prison factory labor is practiced are trying to abolish it. It is a curse to every man it touches. Under the contract system the labor contractor usually becomes the real head of the institution and the warden merely a igurehead.

When I took charge of the prison at Canon City we had 500 idle men in the institution. These have since been put to work at road building and in op-A Player Piano without a few erating a 1,000 acre farm adjoining the an economic proposition. It has provside the prison walls unprofitable because they have paid too much attention, to guarding the convicts. Armed Upon receipt of a five or ten guards have frequently cost more than my experience that prisoners are just ed guards and do the work more efficlently. We are at present working 50 per cent of our prisoners outside the prison purely on the honor system. I am sure that 75 per cent of the men in the average prison can be successfully handled in this manner, with a small percentage of escapes. Work on the roads is sought for by our prisoners. We make it an object for them
