WORTH OF A NEWSPAPER

Nearly every politician is eager to come into a newspaper office to ask the paper's support. Almost every man is ready to ask a newspaper to suppress certain news concerning them. Almost every man is anxious to have a newspaper publish something commendatory to themselves. Nearly every man or woman will come forward and declaim against what they term the partisanship of the press any time the newspapers fail to report some trivial matter that may concern themselves.

But where is the newspaper man who finds that the general public is giving up news of the day without being importuned for it? Of course, there are exceptions but they are few. Oftimes public men do not know the news value of a story, or knowing, refuse to tell what they know. Then wonder why they drop from public notice.

Newspaper men and reporters are well aware that the biggest men are the easiest to approach. It is said that Theodore Roosevelt was the best advertised man in the United States, because he never closeted himself from the newspaper fraternity. William J. Bryan is another man whose name appears in the press of the United States every day because he maintains open door to newspaper men. President Wilson is advertised throughout the world, in space that is unbuyable, because that he announced from the first that every proceeding of the government should be an open book to the correspondents.

What would be the fate of these men if the newspapers decided to eliminate their names from the news columns? They would be as dead as Julius Caesar.

ADDITIONAL BRIEFS

Good roads workers of the two states will meet at Medford June 6, when the proposed new road between California and Oregon will be discussed. This route, lately surveyed, is designed to avoid bad grade in the present road. A campaign will be started by Jackson County for the issuance of bonds for road purposes.

Mrs. Frank Hutchins returned last Saturday evening from Reno where she has been the past few weeks under the care of Dr. Morrison. Mrs. Hutchins had an operation performed for cancer of the breast which proved thoroughly successful, and the Examiner is glad to report that she returns with every assurance of a speedy and entire recovery.

F. M. Eshleman, representing Jeremiah Williams Co., Boston, and James J. Goode, of Eisenmann Bros., Boston, wool buyers, are in Lakeview looking over the local market. Evidently they are exercising extreme precaution in their moves as thus far they have made no contracts for any local clips. Mr. Goode took considerable Nevada

wool on consignment. The balloon containing four men which last week ascended at Roseburg landed the second day in the isolated districts of the Cascade mountains about 75 miles from Roseburg. All the occupants were safe and a very successful landing was effected. An altitude of 12,000 feet was reached, and it was considered the most successful ascension ever attempted on the Pacific Coast.

A swarm of bees mysteriously made their appearance in town yesterday afternoon and settled on a tree near the Cloud residence in North Lakeview. A. Storkman, who is a thorough bee man, succeeded in gathering in the entire swarm and now has them at his home. As there are no bee hives in Lakeview it is thought that they came from some nearby bee tree in the mountains.

County Fruit Inspector J. L. Hampton of Summer Lake passed through Lakeview yesterday enroute to New Pine Creek. Mr. Hampton states that pear blight is quite prevalent in various parts of the county but that conditions in general of apples and peaches are good. He reports that prospects are most promising for good fruit crops in his section as well as all other portions of the county which he has visited.

More interest is being shown in eugenics, the science of growing perfect babies, throughout the state since the first eugenics show was held last year at the State Fair. The first tests of babies has just been held by the Parents' Educational Bureau, of Portland and this promises to become a regular institution. Babies are given a careful scientific examination and defects pointed out to parents with instructions as to how they may be overcome. Parents who intend entering youngsters in the coming shows next Fall find these preliminary tests helpful.

 District No. 11 Cogswell Creek—Mint Vernon.
 In the matter of the report of R. H. Rogers, Deputy County Surveyor,

R. A. Paxton and Creed Pendleton, Sr., viewers heretofore appointed to survey, view and report on that certain road petitioned for by J. B. Elder, S. P. Dicks and other free holders of Lake County, Oregon, residing in Road Districts Number 3 and 4 of Lake County, Oregon, said road being in said Road Districts, for complete description of same reference is hereby made to map and profile of said road which was filed in the County Clerk's office, March 1, 1913, report of said Deputy County Surveyor and viewers, having, been duly filed here in on the 1st day of March 1913, the same was read in open Court for the second time this 8th day of May, 1913, and it appearing to the Court that the petition herein referred to, praying for said road, was duly signed by forty-five freeholders, residing in Road Districts number 3 and 4 of Lake County, Oregon, and that on the 2d day of January, 1913, said petition was regularly taken up and R. A. Paxton and Creed Pendleton, Sr., were appointed viewers to meet with the County Surveyor on February 3, 1913, or within five days thereafter and after qualifying, to proceed to view and survey said proposed road.

That said viewers did meet with Deputy County Surveyor, R. H. Rogers on the 3rd day of February, 1913 and did qualify as such viewers and Deputy County Surveyor and did then proceed to view and survey said proposed road: that the report of said Deputy County Surveyor and viewers, was in due form, filed in this Court on March 1913, and was publically read in open Court on two different dates, to-wit: on May 7, 1913 and on May 8, 1913 that said Deputy County Surveyor, R. H. Rogers did on the 1st day of March 1913, file necessary maps and profile of said road together with the field notes, as required by law and it further appearing from said report on file herein that the opening and laying out of said road to be a public necessity, it is therefore, hereby ordered that the reports of R. A. Paxton and Creed Pendleton Sr., as viewers and Deputy County Surveyor, R. H. Rogers of Lake County, Oregon with reference to the laying out and opening of said County Road in Road Districts No. 3 and 4 of Lake County, Oregon be and the same hereby approved and said road be allowed and it is further ordered that the road supervisors of Road Districts No. 3 and 4 respectively, be and they are hereby directed to open and lay out said County Road for the use of the public as soon as there is money in said Districts available, for that purpose.

It is further ordered that all papers in reference to this road matter and hereby are referred to the District Attorney for his official action as required by law.

Thereupon Court adjourned until May 9, 1913 at 9 o'clock a. m.
