"If you can get a farmer to handle your line you have an investment that is good until the cows come home."

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Turn to page 4 of this issue of the Examiner and read the ad of the Parisian Millinery. In the ad will be found good food for thought. The management of the millinery makes the assertion that "Perhaps you have seen a hat in some catalog you would like. Bring the catalog in with you, we will make up the same hat, of better material, for the same price. We will compete with any millinery establishment in the United States, all we ask is a fair trial." Nothing could be fairer, and any institution adopting this method should be encouraged. And this example should be emulated by other establishments in certain lines. It would be a direct and effective sweat at the (with apologies to President Wilson) insidious mail order concern.

Little Americans who continually dwell on the cost of armament see only one side of the picture. The cost of preparation for war is nothing compared with the cost of war invited by being unprepared. Japan's war with Russia piled on her a debt of \$1,271,745,000, the interest on which is alone a great burden. The faces of the many farmers who were in town Saturday were radiant with joy over the refreshing rain which fell Friday night. They all feel that it will be a great crop maker.

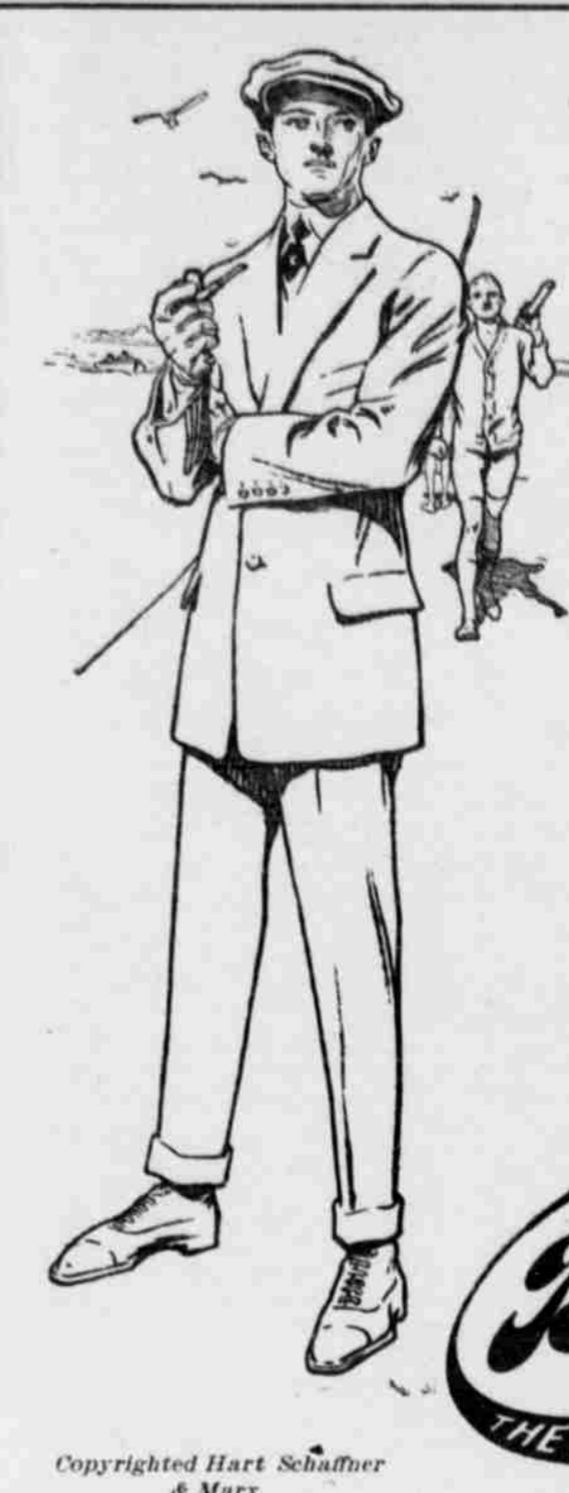
