The appointment of Miss Mamie Winters as postmistress of Burns has been confirmed and she expects to take up the duties of the office in a few days.  
A quite heavy rain fell in this section of the valley Wednesday afternoon and night and again this morning, which soaked the ground to a considerable depth.

Congressman Raker reports the increase of pension of Schuble Gillette of Willow Ranch, Modoc county, California, at the rate of \$19.00 per month. The soldier served in Co. H. 38th Iowa Infantry.

President Wilson has ordered the restoration to entry of 600 acres along the Pit River in Modoc County that was withdrawn for power sites. Of this, eighty acres lie five miles south of Alturas, and 520 acres are northeast of Alturas.

The American Association of Nurse-rymen is in session this week at Portland, closing next Saturday. Present conditions and future prospects of all phases of the fruit growing business in the Northwest is being fully discussed at the convention.

Although efforts to set aside the patents issued to sixteen entrymen in the "37-10" country have met with no success in the United States Land office, the district federal court for Oregon and the circuit court of appeals, A. D. Daniels, who is seeking to have these patents declared trustees of title for him, will carry the case still higher.

The office fixtures and supplies of the Goose Lake Irrigation Co. are being removed from the Umbach building to the new quarters in the Heryford building. The Company will occupy the two rooms in the extreme southwest corner on the third floor, and Chief Engineer Rice is congratulating himself upon securing such light and roomy offices.

That the dairy business in Oregon is growing at a tremendous rate and that in value it far exceeds the state's next largest crop—livestock—is the statement of State Dairy and Food Commissioner Mickel in a recently issued bulletin. The value of dairy products for 1912 was \$19,000,000 while that of livestock was \$12,000,000. Prospects for a material increase this year are good.

The railroads were given another series of defeats at Washington Monday when, following its contents that the state has the right to regulate corporations within its borders. The United States supreme court made rulings against the railroads in a number of cases where the railroads attacked the laws regarding transportation rates in several states, including Oregon.

The three Indians concerned in the shooting of officers Cady and Nelligan at Tule Lake some time ago have been held to answer a charge of attempting to commit murder, by the Lassen county authorities. The government has directed that their defense be conducted by U. S. District Attorney. A special agent of the Indian department conducted the defense of the Indians at the preliminary examination.
