## MINE LOCATIONS MADE STRINGENT

All Claims Must Actually Contain Mineral in Paying Quantities

Designed primarily for the proper development of the mineral resources of the public land states of the West, the law governing the location of mining property and securing of valid title to such property has been so amended by bureau rulings as at times to seem a hindrance to the development and upbuilding of the West, rather than an assistance.

This is shown in recent instructions issued to the United States land offices, adverse comments upon which are wide spread. These rulings say:

"Mineral found in surface rock alone will not amount to a discovery unless the same contains ore in paying quantities. Discovery of mineral cannot be claimed simply because the surface indications, combined with geological inference, indicate that other and unconnected lozes or veins lie at a greater depth."

In further explanation it is stated: There must be a vein or line of quartz or other rock in place, must carry gold or some other valuable mineral deposit.

"The two preceding elements, when taken together, must be such as to warrant a prudent man in the expenditure of his time and money in the effort to develop a valuable mine."

Favorable to the foregoing, it may be said that these rulings are designed to aid in the doing away of the "wild cat" promoter, such a one as would float a company upon any sort of property, without questioning its real value.

The intention also is, no doubt, to put a stop to the practice of locating a dozen or more claims around a likely prospect—which may or may not be a good thing, according to the view taken.

In effect, too strict an interpretation of these and other rulings will operate to prevent the location and working of claims that upon the surface do not give strong indications of mineral, yet which at depth may prove to contain valuable ore deposits.

Such examples of properties which are shown to be valuable only after the expenditure of money in deep development work, may readily be found in most of the mining states. Perhaps the most widely known examples are those of the porphyry coppers in Arizona, where many of the properties, surface indications have been far from enticing, yet where drill exploration has revealed values at depth.

It is to be hoped that these rulings may be interpreted with a liberal mind. Otherwise, it may be that they will work to the detriment of the mining industry, rather than to its advancement.

### Ranchman's Bread

Ranchman's bread is made as follows, according to the receipt in the camp cookery bulletin issued last year by the Oregon Agricultural College and now out of print:

Mix a lard pail two-thirds full of medium batter of flour and water, adding one tablespoon of sugar. Allow it to stand until the mixture has fermented and then become sour. Pour out about half a cup of the sour dough and add half a teaspoon of salt, a teaspoon of lard and enough flour to make a very soft dough.

Melt lard or other grease in a pan and drop the dough in with a spoon, turning it over in the grease. Allow it to raise until about double in bulk, and then bake. The half cup of sour dough taken out may be poured back in the lard pail and the original quantity of batter stirred up. It will all be sour in a few hours, and ready for use. The exact amount of soda added depends on the sourness of the dough, and must be determined by experience.

## WHY PEOPLE SEND MONEY FROM HOME

Girl Writes Prize Essay on Patronage of Mail Order Houses

(Prize essay written by Matel E. Davenport, Silverton High School.)

In my composition it is my intention to tell why the mail-order house is a menace to local dealers.

In the first place, the mail-order houses can sell goods into any town without paying a license, while on the other hand the local dealer pays a license upon every article that he offers for sale.

But why do people persist in sending to some large mail-order house instead of patronizing their own merchants and building up their own towns?

It is because the mail-order house can advertise and make everything appear something it is not and can make you think that you are getting a wonderful bargain; but in the end you have paid dearly for your bargain, by the time the expressage or freight has been paid.

Some people can not understand why the local dealer can not sell his goods as low as the mail-order houses, but it is really very clear, if you have any reasoning power at all.

In the first place the mail-order houses lose no bad debts, because they do a cash business.

Secondly, most mail-order houses do not carry a large stock of goods, but merely keep an office and send all orders direct to the manufacturer, so that they pay no taxes on their office fixtures, which is a very small sum compared to the city, county and state tax paid by your local dealer. This money paid by local dealers is used to build good roads, churches and other improvements that build up your country and make it famous.

Another reason that some mail-order houses can lower their prices is that they employ thousands of girls and pay on an average of four dollars per week; barely enough for them to live upon, not taking their clothes into consideration.

The local dealer can not hire his help for any such price as that and thereby lowers his profit.

Do the mail-order houses help to build roads or give money for charity?

No! They double every cent that you send them and then get up big bargains to get you to send more.

Yet some people insist upon sending their money to these houses for some millionaire to double and add to his already enormous roll of bills, instead of investing it in their own town where it would be of some benefit to the country.

Do not be deceived by a lot of advertising, but remember that the mail-order house will make a profit upon the goods sold you that will double the amount of the order.

No wonder that they can draw trade from our local dealers! It is because they are deceitful; they pay no taxes to speak of, and pay wages that cause girls to become deceitful and steal in order to live, or else live a life of shame.

The local man is your friend, so do not help the millionaire but be a booster for home industry.
