Under the new law voters will not have to register but once as long as they do not fail to vote at each election.

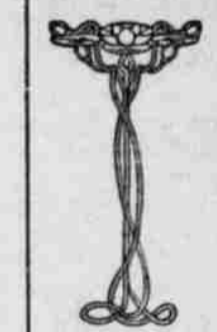
