"No man can do business of any magnitude," said a retail man recently, "or would care to, for that matter, without credit, but the very ease with which credit may be obtained may be a pitfall and one into which a good many retail merchants have fallen and unless human nature changes are likely to fall in the future.

"But there is one safe course to follow which at least will prevent complications arising as a result of carelessness, and that is to adopt a rule to pay every bill and interest account when it is due. Many a bill has been let run over when to pay it would be just as easy as to omit doing so, and loose ends of debt accumulate in a way that is surprising when a full summing up is made of them.

"Then, too, it is true that if the debts are left at loose ends some one may take it into his head to gather the loose ends together and so tie up the man who should have looked after them. This may be a bad metaphor, but it is certainly good logic.

"So, as I said in the beginning," said the merchant, "the best thing to do is to pay all bills when due, even if to do so you shall have to borrow the necessary money with which to take care of them, since doing so at least has the merit of concentrating the indebtedness and placing it where provision can be made for its handling easily when opportunity offers to take it up."

HOME MERCHANT SHOULD NEVER HAVE DULL TIMES

Nothing wins so well as constant work. Often we hear a merchant complaining about dull times. Perhaps his neighbor is doing a rushing business, for the simple reason that his neighbor keeps busy. If customers are not coming in so rapidly as he might wish the busy man takes time to get busier and devises some new scheme to bring trade to the store.

Perhaps he busies himself in rearranging his goods in attractive manner on the shelves and in the showcases. If he finds some of the clerks who are complaining of his being dull he immediately gets those clerks busy getting out old goods and arranging them in a manner that he can carry on a cleaning up sale to advantage.

IMPROVING THE WHOLE STATE

University of Illinois Takes Unique Method to Reach Public.

The University of Illinois has been sending out an "Australian ballot for farmers," upon which the following ten items are listed opposite squares to be checked after the heading "I Will" and returned to the university:

"Plant or improve my windbreak; screen unsightly objects; save old trees on lawn, roadside or field; plant something to attract friendly birds; plant bushes and vines against foundations of my house; make a good, open lawn; improve views of my house and the prairie; help the children make a flower garden; plant a border sacred to native trees, Illinois shrubs and prairie flowers; replan my home grounds. Without agreeing to pay anything I seriously desire help on the above matters, and if I get it I will tell you what improvements I make and the cost."

The University of Illinois is also waging an active campaign for the planting of all roadsides with trees and has a department for that special work under the leadership of Wilhelm Miller, Ph. D., assistant professor of landscape horticulture.

"SWAT THE FLY!"

Every one who has the interest and health of his community at heart should do battle with the deadly insect wherever it goes. In the city of New York alone the total number of deaths from diseases that have been traced directly to the fly for an average of five years ending Jan. 1, 1912, are as follows:

Typhoid fever	56
Tuberculosis (all kinds)	10,222
Cholera infantum	6,298
Cerebrospinal meningitis	404
Diphtheria	1,829
Scarlet fever	1,023
Brucellosis	1,468
Smallpox	3

In addition are the following diseases: Bubonic plague, pellagra, Asiatic cholera, leprosy, anthrax, conjunctivitis, ophthalmia and infantile paralysis. The last is not classified as such by the city board of health, but the state board of health reported forty deaths in 1911.
