## CULTIVATION IS MOST IMPORTANT

Water on Land is Only a Starter for Settlers—Actual Work Needed.

Success of irrigation enterprises depends, after all, on bringing the land under cultivation. The soil may be never so rich, the supply of water never so abundant, the construction of the plant never so excellent, but unless the land is made to produce, no interest can be paid on bonds, no dividends can be paid on stock, not enough money will be available for maintenance. In consequence private irrigation companies will go bankrupt and further Government reclamation work must be checked by the failure of the money already expended to return to the fund. The course of irrigation has been the spectator. Relying upon the industry of his neighbors to increase the value of big lands, he buys a tract in a private project or locates a farm in a Government project, does little or no cultivation, but sits down, waiting to sell out at a profit. If, when weary of waiting, he is called upon to pay for water-right on a private tract, or maintenance charge on a Government project, he "roasts" the company or the Government for oppressing the poor settler, he "knocks" the whole enterprise and discourages real farmers from settling. He furnishes an excuse for red-tape-bound bureaucrats to be unnecessarily harsh with men who are really trying to make a farm but lack the capital to pull them through the first year or two, when there is much outgo and little or no income.

In settling the Canadian Northwest the Canadian Pacific Railroad does things better. Knowing that personal character is the chief element in success it sends agents through the eastern province of Canada and through the eastern states, who pick young farmers noted for honesty, energy and success in farming, and, after thoroughly investigating them, offers to start them on one of the tracts it irrigated. The company furnishes the entire capital necessary, erects farm buildings, breaks up land and puts in the first crop. The selected settler thus moves to a going farm and pays for it year by year out of the profits. By this means each farm is made an assured success and the company is assured of a return on its investment and of the traffic the farm produces. Selection of settlers is the first requisite to the success of an irrigation scheme. Get the right kind of men, then give them a start. Shut out the speculators and weed out the failures and incompetents. An irrigated tract is not complete until it has been occupied by men who will make it a success. Construction of the plant and putting water on the land are only the beginning of the work—Oregonian.

### La Pine Will Entertain

Posters announcing the grand good roads meeting, with a barbecue in connection, to be held at La Pine on August 9 to 13, inclusive have reached this city. La Pine is in the north western part of Lake County and about 150 miles from here.

Two widely known good roads advocates, Col. Charles W. Thatcher and County Judge W. S. Worden, of Klamath, will be present and will be the principal speakers. W. A. Lynch and W. F. King, president and secretary of the Crook County Good Roads Association, will also attend the meeting. It is expected that a good sized delegation from this county will attend.

### Catlow Being Settled

Bend Bulletin: Under the leadership of T. A. McComb of Plano, Ill., a party of colonists left yesterday morning for the Catlow Valley where they plan to take up land. The members of the party, 15 altogether, all belong to the United Presbyterian church and it is their plan to take up adjoining claims and thereby gain the advantages of a co-operative community from the beginning. Various trades are represented, including carpenters, mechanics, masons and practical farmers, and at a later date a clergyman and a physician are expected to join the settlement.
