FEDERAL LAW FOR **GAME REGULATION**

come Effective October First This Year.

Much has been said regarding the new national law to protect birds, but the most detailed description is given below which recently appeared in the Portland Journal.

On and after Uctoper 1 a federal law for the pretection of migratory birds, such as wild ducks, geese, pigeons, brant and snipe, goes into effect, and supersedes all state regulations governing open and closed hunting seasons wherever state codes conflict, with the government's statute. The ffederal code likewise extends sprotection to a number of shore [birds, fand in some cases declares a five year closed season.

The new law will terminate all spring shooting of migratory birds throughout the United States, and in Oregon will make the bunting season extend from October 1 to January 16, provided the recommendations of State Game Warden Finley are followed. Otherwise the hunting season for this state will be from September 16 to December 16, as tentative regulations just assued by the government provide.

Congress enacted the measure last spring, and it was approved by President Taft March 4. It was enacted as a result of agitation of the National Association of Audubon Societies of America and the American Game Protection and Propagation association.

Because the hunting regulations of various states were so arranged that migratory birds were afforded little or no protection on their northward and southward fights, the two organizations urged the enactment of a uniform law on the ground that it was the only way to prevent the birds' extinction. This was followed by the enactment of 'he Weeks-McLean bill, which provided, among other things, that the department of agriculture be authorized to draw up suitable regulations for the birds' protection.

The department turned the work over to the bureau of biological survey which has arranged tentative regulations subject to revision before being put up to President Wilson for his approval October 1. Immediately after the president has approved them they will become effective.

The regulations as now arranged divide the country into two zones. Zone 1, known as the breeding zone, comprises all states lying wholly or in part north of 40 degrees latitude. The wintering zone, or zone 2, includes all states south of the line.

In zone 1, the open season on waterfowl is fixed between September 1 and December 16, except in Oregon and New York, where the season extends from September 16 to December 16.

In this connection State Game Warden Finley has recommended the open eason be changed to and close January 16. He talked the matter over with Henry W. Henshaw, chief of the bureau of biological survey when Mr. Henshaw was in Portland recently, and received assurances that every effort would be made to have the dates changed to coincide with Mr. Finley's suggestion.

"I believe the federal law is a long step toward preserving our game birde," said Mr. Finley. "It will bring about a uniformity in regulating hunting seasons, and will give the birds a chance to multiply. I am a member of the advisory committee appointed to assist the executive committee of the bureau to compile the regulations, and am in complete accord with its actions.

"In Oregon several changes in the open season will obtain when the regulations go in force. The last legislature enacted measures making different open seasons for Oregon. Under the state code, the open season extends from September 15 to December 31, in Multnomah, Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, and Coos county. The open season for other Willamette valley counties extends from November 1 to February 15, while in Lake, Harney. Malheur and Grant counties ducks, geese, etc., can be hunted rom September 15 to March 15.

"Under the federal law the sesson will open and close in all sections at the same time, after it goes into effect October 1. Until then, the state regulations will hold.

"I intend to have a bill introduced at the next legislature, changing the open seasons to conform with the federal regulations in regard to migratory birds, and this will remove all elements of conflict.

"As the federal code provides a daily closed season from sunset to sunrise, it will nullity our present law which allows duck and geese hunting half an hour before sunrise and half an hour atter sunset.
