IRRIGATION WILL ATTRACT FARMERS

Director Newell of the Reclamation Service writes in the Klamath Northwestern:

The cry goes up from Oregon, as well as from other parts of the West, for more farmers. With her wonderful agricultural opportunities we must have more re-claimers, men who can utilize these opportunities in the production of good crops. Why is it that with these opportunities immigration has dropped off and nearly ceased? This is the question that the railroad men are asking, and in conference held in Chicago, in Salt Lake City, and elsewhere, the subject has been debated.

To answer the question we must first ask what has brought the influx of farmers during the past ten years. Ask any successful farmer and he will reply "cheap land!" This is what is attracting experienced farmers from the East and Middle West, land drawing them in large numbers to the South and to Canada. Why do they not continue to come to Oregon as they did a few years ago? The answer is obvious: Because there is little cheap land left. The home-seeker who has made an excursion into the far West brings back the same story. He cannot find land at a price where it appears to him that he can make a profit by his venture.

No well-informed man is willing to agree to pay for land unless he sees an opportunity of bettering his condition. The real farmer appreciates that there are risks in pioneering and in going into a country with which he is familiar. These risks are real, as shown by the experience of the men on the ground, and to compensate for these risks he must see a correspondingly large profit. How then are we to attract more farmers?

The cry has been "Develop more land; get ready for the influx from the East, and put larger and larger areas under irrigation." This has gone to the extent where there are now millions of acres of land in the arid West for which water has been provided at the expense of tens of millions of dollars. These lands are still untouched and are being held for increase in value. Go to any irrigated region and the home-seeker is struck by the fact that the cultivated lands are often mere spots on the vast horizon of sage brush. Take it in Oregon, for example, on the Umatilla project. The Government at large expense has provided for over 10,000 acres, but in 1912 after several years of development, less than 5,000 acres are in crop scattered over the area.

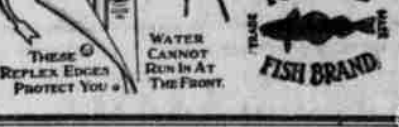
