Several people were killed and damage estimated at \$100,000 was done in a series of cloudbursts which swept over Goldfield, Nevada last Saturday. Several mines in that section were flooded as a result of the cloudburst. Goldfield is located in a basin, with a low range of mountains to the south and two deep gulches skirting the east and west sections of the town. The gulches were soon roaring rivers and all houses in their paths were swept away.
