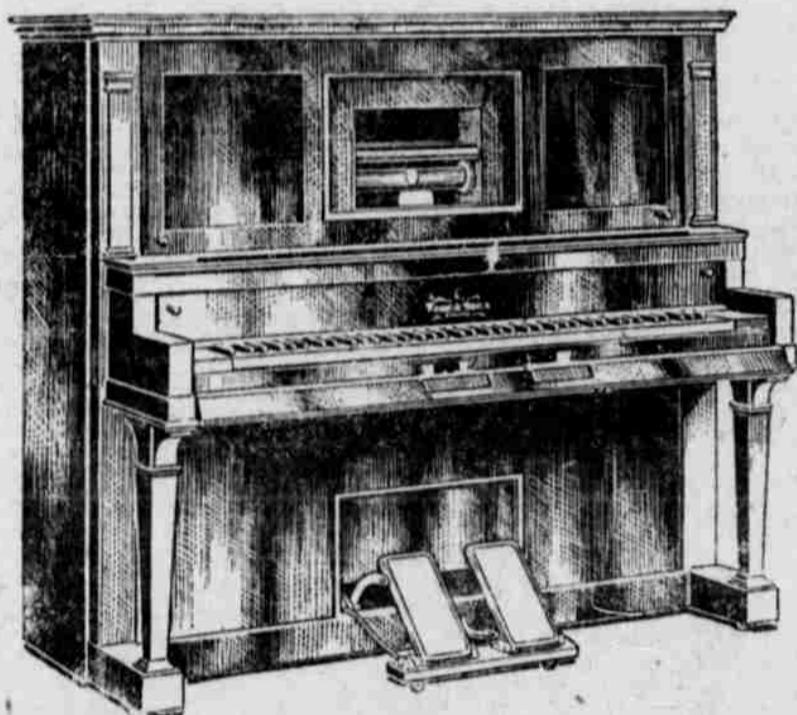

SAGEBRUSH MAY CONTAIN RUBBER

Appropriation Asked from U. S. to Make Test in the State of Nevada.

Reno Journal: That there is a possibility of turning the sagebrush flats into commercial rubber, there is absolutely no question. Recent experiments along this line carried on in this city by several residents, who have some knowledge of the product, has led to an extensive correspondence with Congressman Raker of California, and a number of samples of the product, in the unfinished state, have been forwarded at his request, says the Carson Appeal.

Not alone is the California representative busy on this matter, but parties who have been manufacturing rubber from the Guayule plant, Mexico, are sending for samples and even asking for seed of the grease brush, this being the more prolific in rubber sap than the real sage.

There is one outfit that would probably endeavor to interfere with the production of rubber from sage brush, and that would be the rubber trusts, as should it be shown that rubber of commercial value can be made from sage brush there would be a tremendous tumble in the price of the product, which is mainly imported by the trust, and sold at their own figures.

Recently parties from Arizona have sent to this city for samples of the Nevada brush. It is proposed to plant the seed of the greasewood in Arizona to take the place of the Guayule plant, which has been practically exterminated or used up in that section. It now seems that the old sage brush flats of Nevada are to be worth something. Every acre of the yellow blossoming plant that one sees is worth coin, and in a few years will be turned into commercial value. The proposition has been carried to a point where it is not an experiment, but actual rubber has been produced from the brush in this section. In the crude handling at least one-half an ounce of rubber is extracted from the brush, and anyone with sight that was given him can see thousands of acres of this brush decorating the state.

As greasewood, or rabbitbrush, or prickly brush, all containing rubber, reproduces within four years, the advantage is readily seen. It is a matter that can be turned to a big thing in this state, and should the United States fail to make an appropriation for this problem, the state could invest a sum of money to the greatest advantage, as every county in the state is covered with sagebrush and there is rubber in every plant.
