Spend a Million a Year Charles G. Gates, the famous millionaire, died last week aboard his special train at Cody, Wyo., from a stroke of apoplexy. Mr. Gates in company with his wife came west about a month ago believing he would benefit his health by traveling in the western climate. His body was taken to New York for burial. In Portland recently a negro porter fainted away when Gates tipped him to a \$1000 bill. He inherited about \$20,000,000 when his father, John W. Gates, died in Paris three years ago. The son announced at the time that it was his ambition to spend all the money and die a poor man but it is estimated that his estate is worth about \$10,000,000.
