### N.-C.-O. Pays Damages

Reno Gazette: With the filing of a document called a satisfaction of judgment, in the district court, the case of William Konig against the Nevada-California-Oregon railway was ended in the district court recently. The plaintiff received \$11,985.17 in full settlement of the original judgment given on the jury's finding of damages to the extent of \$15,000, the sum representing reduction of the verdict by the supreme court to \$10,000 with interest and costs added.

The payment comes in a little less than four years from the time of the injury. William Konig, then about 54 years old, was employed in the shops of the defendant company in 1909, and on December 1 of that year was injured while operating a circular saw.

# WAR TALES EVER REMAIN BRIGHT

From the tales told around the camp-fire at every annual reunion of the survivors, the annals of our Civil War might be rewritten. A famous Confederate warrior, who in his old age gained new fighting fame in the Spanish-American war, was Gen. Joseph Wheeler. Although he was a chieftain of tremendous force when in battle, he was small in stature, slight in build and of unassuming appearance as a civilian.

Shortly after the United States had declared war against Spain, and while the preparations for sending the army to Cuba were in active progress, a stranger in Washington observed a number of distinguished Senators gathering round a little gray-bearded man whom they had encountered at the steps of the Capitol, and shaking his hand with enthusiasm.

"Who's that little old chap they're making so much fuss over?" he said, addressing an elderly, stoop-shouldered man who was standing near him and looking at the group with kindling eyes.

"Little!" exclaimed the other. "That's Fighting Joe Wheeler. If ever you'd been in a big battle and seen him coming toward you at the head of a galloping army of wild men, as I have, you'd know better than to call him little! He's as big as a house!"

Terrible as it is to be slain in battle there is one thing the soldier fears worse, declares the veteran. That is to miss the honor of taking part in a great battle and to die ingloriously at home when his country needs him. An artillery man from Michigan brought this out during the Civil War.

The man had only just gone to the front and had seen no real fighting. One day while on the march he fell and was run over by the gun-carriage. He was so badly crushed that, sorely against his will, he had to be furloughed and sent home.

While he lay in bed under the doctor's care the battle of Gettysburg was fought. The man feared he would die, and keenly regretted that, since he must go, it could not have been on that glorious field. He called upon the doctor to near his last request.

"Doctor, if I go, promise me this. My stone shall bear these words: 'Killed at Gettysburg in the front of battle.'"

"But you weren't," objected the physician.

"I know. But it wasn't my fault. If you can't say that, then say: 'Killed at Gettysburg—during a temporary absence at Brookfield.'"

General Phil Sheridan came of "the fighting race"—pure Irish stock. His old father and mother, Irish both, "waiting at home" while their son was in the forefront of battle, had to bear torments of suspense, but they never for a moment lost faith in the skill and courage of "Little Phil."

The old people were living in Somerset, O., when word came that General Sheridan had suffered a great defeat in the Shenandoah Valley. They slept none that night, but in the morning the old gentleman said:

"Mother, I have thought it all out. Phil wasn't there when the fight began. That is what the paper said. It would not be like our boy to remain away throughout the battle. As I make it out, Phil returned in time to save the day. I'll go to the store and wait until the paper comes, get the news and hurry back. I don't believe there's anything to worry about."

"I hope you are right, father, but I'm afraid yesterday's news was correct. Phil has had so much good luck I'm afraid he's had bad luck in this battle."

Old Mr. Sheridan was sitting on the steps in front of the store when a man rode up and called out: "Good news from Sheridan!"

Then one of the bystanders caught up the morning paper and read the account of Sheridan's return to the army; of his turning the tide; of the President's message, of Sheridan's heroic conduct, and the complete rout of the enemy.

The paper said it was one of the greatest victories of the war.

That was enough for Mr. Sheridan. He started on a trot to tell Mrs. Sheridan the news about her son's greatest battle.

She saw him coming and hurried to the gate to get the tidings from Cedar Creek.

"Glory to God, mother! Glory to God! Phil licked 'em! The President has sent him the country's thanks, and the paper says it was one of the greatest fights of the war. I knew Phil would get back in time to save the day."

"Thanks be to God!" cried the mother, and clasping hands in an ecstasy of gratitude, the valiant parents of a valiant son uttered no other word until they entered the house, when, kneeling together they offered thanksgiving for little Phil.—Ex.
